# CONDEMNNS SIX MILK BOTTLES COUNTY

### Inspector of Weights and Measures Boyer Examined 39 Receptacles in March



Half a dozen of the thirty-nine milk bottles examined during the past month were condemned by Harry A. Boyer, county inspector of weights and measures, according to his report for March filed with the county Commissioners. The other thirty-three were sealed. Twenty yardsticks were tested and passed upon, while thirty-six oil pumps were sealed.

Of scales examined 61 were tested, 53 sealed, 7 adjusted and 8 were condemned; 80 dry and 156 liquid measures were tested and sealed, while 168 miscellaneous measures were tested, 160 sealed, 7 were adjusted and 8 were condemned. Just 204 weights were tested, 168 were sealed, 39 were adjusted and 18 were condemned.

### Fifty Insane Patients March in Safety From Burning State Hospital

Chicago, April 13.—Fire which broke out in the hospital annex of the Chicago State Hospital for the Insane at DuSable, northwestern of the city to-day, spread rapidly. The building is of frame construction, two stories high in some sections and in others only one. It is about 200 feet from the main hospital.

The inmates all escaped. By the time the firemen arrived the hospital attendants were escorting the fifty patients housed in the building to safety. The building was used for the accommodation of mildly insane persons convalescing from various ills. Several previous fires in the structure had warned the institution's officials of its dangerous character and as a consequence the rescue work was quickly organized.

### Capt. George Jack Begins Cavalry Troop Inspections

Captain George C. Jack, of the Governor's Troop, has been detailed to inspect three troops of the First Regiment of Cavalry, which is commanded by Colonel John P. Wood, of Philadelphia.

Captain Jack will start his duties to-night with an inspection of Troop I of the Third Squadron, commanded by Captain Charles F. Clement, Troop I is stationed at Sunbury.

Later Troop M, of Lewisburg, which is commanded by Captain Ralph S. Koser, and the First Troop, Philadelphia City Cavalry, commanded by Captain J. Franklin McFadden, will be inspected.

The Governor's Troop will be inspected during May in its new armory in State street.

the specific reference to the full crew law in the repeal, but the House would not agree to it after Mr. Baldwin had said there was no necessity for amendment. It is now on third reading.

At the opening session of the House Chaplain Howard Fry, and those who held the ones asked for, rose and told all the good things—and some of the bad they knew about each other.

So successful was the affair that arrangements are under way for a luncheon every week. They have been held before but were discontinued before the holidays.

Mr. Berntheisel, Lancaster, rising to a question of personal privilege, said he was reporting on the bill, when he had voted for them. It transpired that he had been mixed up with Mr. Rothberger, Berks, in some newspaper accounts, but that he was all right on the record.

Salary Halted Killed. Objecting to a \$6,000 salary for county controllers in Berks, Cambria, Fayette, Lancaster, Montgomery, Schuylkill and Westmoreland, caused defeat of the bill with that object.

THE ON THE FLOOR. During the second reading calendar Mr. Ehrhardt, Lackawanna, attempted to amend the Senate bill for an elective poor board in Scranton to make the salary \$1,000. Mr. Dawson said that \$1,200 was not too much and charged that Mr. Ehrhardt's motion was only a plan to have the bill go back to the Senate. Mr. Dawson declared the people wanted an elective board and had been trying to get one for twenty-six years. The amendment was defeated.

Mr. Cromer, Allegheny, enlivened the House again this morning. He went after a bill to increase the salary of an orphan's court officer in Allegheny county and Mr. Stein hit back, saying Mr. Cromer speaks on so many things, ought to know the Allegheny judges favored the bill.

In reply Mr. Cromer said that any legislation increasing pay seemed to go through like greased lightning. The chaplain hardly gets through praying for the commonwealth when the members begin to prey on it. The bill passed, 124 to 12.

Bills Passed Finally. Providing short term notes for second class cities. Senate bill extending right of appeal to common pleas courts from assessments for taxation to municipalities and public corporations. Fixing at \$4,500 salary of first assistant clerk of orphans' court in Allegheny county.





PEACE NEGOTIATIONS NOT CONSIDERED IN BERLIN. Rome, April 13, 11.45 P. M., via Paris, April 13, A. M.—Information obtained from the highest German sources in this city is to the effect that there is absolutely no basis for the report that peace negotiations under conditions are being considered in Berlin. These reports, it is said, are based upon ignorance of actual conditions in the German empire. The assertion is made that both Germany and Austria, particularly the former, have within their borders supplies of everything necessary to prolong the war indefinitely.

DENY MOVE FOR PEACE. Rome, April 12, 9.30 P. M., via Paris, April 13, 4.55 A. M.—Caraso Effendi, a member of the Turkish Chamber of Deputies and Midhat Bey, ex-secretary of the Turkish committee of union and progress, who arrived here last week, have left for Constantinople by way of Venice and Vienna after interviewing Italian statesmen. They deny their mission was in relation to a separate peace for Turkey.
