### Want Report on Foot and Mouth Epidemic

Resolutions calling upon State Veterinarian C. J. Marshall for detailed statements regarding expenditures, methods and orders during the campaign for the eradication of the foot and mouth disease in Pennsylvania the last six months were presented to the House of Representatives to-day by Mr. Wilson, Jefferson, and sent to the committee on agriculture with a request for early action.  
The resolutions contain over a dozen requests for information and some interrogatories as to why certain actions were taken. Detailed information is asked on expenditures of all kinds, especially under the act carrying half a million dollars to indemnify farmers and cattle owners whose animals were killed and property destroyed to prevent spread of the disease. Similar resolutions abound last session when an organized attack was made against the veterinarian and came to nothing.

### FAILED TO PAY TAX
