**NEW BUREAU-HELP TO TAX REVISION BOARD**

noted in such a way that up-to-date information as to the status of ownership of every house and lot in Harrisburg will be available.

The ordinance provides that a certified copy of such information can be had by application to the bureau upon payment of a dollar fee. All owners of property which have not supplied the necessary information as to past and present owners, description of the land, etc., are required by the ordinance to furnish this data within thirty days after the passage of the measure. Because of the unusual amount of work that will be involved, it is probable that the time limit will be extended to three months. A fine of \$5 is provided as a penalty for failure to acquit the bureau of any change in realty holdings. Furthermore, the recorder of deeds, the sheriff and the prothonotary are required to inform the bureau of
