
PURSE SNATCHER HELD

Instead of the usual technical hearing, the commission intends to go into the case from every angle, it is said, and its recommendation, whether for or against Frank, will be like a new verdict.

Attempt Made to Blow Up Biederwolf Tabernacle

Hagerstown, Md., May 2.—What the police regard as a deliberate attempt to blow up the Biederwolf tabernacle, an immense rough timber building seated 7,000 people, being used by the evangelist in his six weeks' campaign here, was made about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, when a quantity of dynamite was exploded at one corner of the structure. Caretaker J. C. Finck, who sleeps in one end of the building, was thrown from his cot and slightly hurt. The explosion billowed up for considerable space around, the actual damage to the tabernacle was slight.
