40,000 BRETHREN AT HERSHEY MEETING

Prospects For Greatest Gathering in History of Church During First Week in June

Hershey, Pa., May 17.—Arrangements for the big annual conference of the Church of the Brethren here June 2-10 are nearly completed. From the reports that have already been received by the committee from the delegates of almost every State in the Union the prospects are that the attendance will be the largest in the history of the denomination.

Last week the committee of arrangements held a lengthy session at this place. Among other matters of business attention was the arranging for five special trains from Reading to this place on the big Sunday, the securing of a special post office in one of the buildings and the erection of the large tabernacle, with a seating capacity of 5,000, in which all of the principal sessions will be held, is being rushed to completion by a large force of workmen.
