N. Y. ADOPTS PLAN OF LOCAL PHYSICIAN

To Pay For Filing of Birth and Death Certificates to Get Perfect Records

In the current issue of the Medical Record is an account of New York's adoption of a plan for the payment of birth and death certificates of particular interest to Harrisburgers.

The New York legislature only recently passed the law known as the Seely bill, which provides that municipalities shall pay physicians 25 cents for each birth certificate or death certificate properly made out and filed. It is estimated that the new law will cost New York city about \$50,000 a year. The Seely bill was a direct copy of a similar bill which originated with Dr. Samuel Z. Shope, the ear, eye, nose and throat specialist of this city, but which was vetoed by Governor Tenor after being passed by the legislature two years ago. The bill was drafted by Dr. Shope with a view to admitting the State Department of Health in the gathering of birth and death certificates, it being pointed out that neglect to file certificates was leading to imperfect records and great inconvenience in many cases. Dr. Shope, of course, could have received no compensation for the filing of the certificates in question, as he is a specialist and does not deal with cases resulting in either births or deaths.

The New York Medical Society was so impressed with the plan suggested by Dr. Shope for the gathering of statistics that it wrote to the local specialist for a copy of the bill and secured its enactment into law in New York this year.

Penrose Names List of Presidential Availables

Special to The Telegraph. Berwick, Pa., May 21.—Before leaving Berwick for Bellefonte, Senator Penrose was asked if there are any candidates for the Republican Presidential nomination who are appearing particularly prominently.

"Not as yet," preference is not crystallizing. Throughout the Republican party it is a matter of discussion, with no active booms launched and no strong movements in motion in behalf of any one of the many men who have been mentioned."

He went on to say there is an abundance of strong presidential timber within the party ranks. Starting in New England, he referred to Senator Weeks, who has been prominently mentioned, in New York, Justice Hughes, Elihu Root and Governor Whitman; in Pennsylvania, Philander Knox and Governor Brumbaugh; in Ohio, Ambassador Herrick, Senator Harding and Senator Burton; in Indiana, ex-Vice-President Fairbanks; in Illinois, Senator Sherman and Congressman Mann.

Asked as to "Uncle Joe" Cannon, he replied that "Cannon's age would put him out of the race of possible Presidential nominees, and then going further West, he mentioned Senator Borah.

Sergeant Fools Prisoner Who Gives Away Evidence

Philadelphia, May 21.—Eugene Burke, alias Birch, 28 years old, of 805 Race street, is being held by the police in the charge of holding two men in the "Tenderloin" yesterday morning. On the way to the police station in the patrol, Burke tried to give a watch to Patrol Sergeant Treton.

"Take the watch, Sarg," Burke is declared to have said, "and then they won't have anything on me."

Treton wasn't that kind of a policeman, however. He took the time-piece and the prisoner was disappointed when he presented it in evidence at the hearing before Magistrate Emely.

Burke's alleged victims are Andrew Nopert, of Lancasterville, and James Henry, of Elkins Park. Nopert said he was relieved of his watch and \$6 in a restaurant by Burke, and the second victim declared Burke picked his pocket of some money in a saloon at Eighth and Cherry streets.

Hopes the New Cabinet Will "Mobilize Women"

London, May 21.—"I hope one of the first acts of the coalition government will be to declare martial law and mobilize both men and women for the service of the country," said Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragists, addressing a meeting at Hull last night.

Mrs. Pankhurst expressed the hope that women would soon be permitted to enlist like men for war service at home. In face of the peril which confronts the country, she declared, it was no time to think of causes espoused in the past. She said she was "willing to obey orders in the service of the country in any capacity."
