IN LETTER TO WIFE HE SAID SAXONIA OR PHILADELPHIA WOULD BE BLOWN UP JULY 7

Wireless Dispatches Sent Out by the Navy Department, Warns Liners of Danger of Internal Explosions; Captain of Philadelphia Feels His Ship Is Safe

MAN IS IDENTIFIED AS LONG SOUGHT MUENTER

Investigation at Mineola Jail Establishes Fact That Holt Committed Suicide by Jumping From Top of His Cell Door While Guard Had His Back Turned; Planned to Blow Up Capitol Here

HOLT IDENTIFIED AS MURDERER BY DETECTIVE... Glen Cove, N. Y., July 7.—Frank Holt, who attempted to take the life of J. P. Morgan and who committed suicide last night in the Mineola jail, was to-day identified as Erich Muentzer, the Harvard instructor, who disappeared after being indicted as the murderer of his wife, Leona, in Cambridge, Mass., in 1906.
