MACKMEN AT LAST OUT OF THE CELLAR

Knowlson, in Debut, Wins For Athletics Despite Putrid Support

New York, July 7. — Courageously pitching a sterling brand of baseball in the face of putrid support, Louis Knowlson, the semi-pro hurler from Ridgeway, Pa., whom Connie Mack secured at the waiver price of nothing in particular, enabled the Athletics to take the third straight game of the series away from the Yankees at the Polo Grounds this afternoon, 7 to 6. It was a season's record—three straight—and incidentally advanced the House of Mack into a tie with St. Louis for sixth place in the race.

That the score was so close was no fault of Knowlson. It seemed that the Mackmen had suddenly become infected with erroritis (or words to that effect), and fumbling, wild throwing and muffing balls appeared to come perfectly natural to them. However, the Mack machine had some batting left in its system, and with timely hits and taking advantage of the hobbles contrived by the Yank players, they managed to win out in the end.

Knowlson's severest test came in the ninth frame, when he pitched himself out of a tight hole when only one run was needed to tie and Captain Peckinpah at bat. One run had already checked in and it was up to Roger to win it with a hit, but the young hurler was as cool as a zephyr from the North Pole and caused Peck to strike out ignominiously—not before a huge crowd of howling fans, but before a small crowd of loyal fans, who anxiously pleaded with him to make a hit. When the third strike was missed three Yanks were left stranded on the base.

Jack Lapp was the home run artist of the day, he getting a circuit clout in the eighth frame.

**FELDER JONES SUSPENDED; RESIGNATION FOLLOWS**  
Kansas City, Mo., July 7.—Felder Jones, manager of the St. Louis Federal League baseball club, was indefinitely suspended by President Gilmore yesterday. Shortstop Johnson was suspended for three days and fined \$50 for his part of the argument with Umpire Harry Howell in yesterday's game, which led to their both being banished from the field. After being sent from the game Jones telegraphed his resignation to one of the owners of the St. Louis club, it was his intention to remain with the team only until arrangements could be made for his successor. Neither Jones nor Johnson was on the field to-day.

Other Changes in the International Rumored

Pittsburgh, July 7.—Secretary W. T. McCullough, of the Pitt Feds, said today that from a recent conversation with International league players it was understood that the Jersey City and Buffalo teams in the International League would follow the Newark team in having their franchises transferred to cities in Pennsylvania.

The Buffalo team would be sent to Scranton and the Jersey City nine to Reading, it is believed. Whether or not Scranton would support another team in a fast league such as the International is probably the only serious question, as the up-staters already are represented in the New York State League. Reading has been without league ball, however, since the Tri-State did not start off this year, but the fans here are anxious for fast ball again. It is said and should a move be made to send the Skeeters to the city it is believed that the fans would make every effort to have the transfer brought about.

Jack Coombs Collapses While Opposing Braves

New York, July 7. — During the fourth inning of the first game between the Boston Braves and Brooklyn Dodgers, yesterday afternoon, Pitcher Jack Coombs, of the Brooklyn team, former Athletic star, collapsed as he was about to pitch to Red Smith, of the Braves, and had to be carried off the field.

It appeared that Coombs was suffering a recurrence of the injury which he suffered during the world's series in 1911.

His collapse yesterday was almost identical with that at the Polo grounds in the world's series game. With two out and the bases empty, Coombs took a long windup preparatory to delivering the ball to Smith. He reached the full height of his windup and then his right arm dropped limply and he sank to the ground apparently in great pain.

An examination at the clubhouse disclosed the fact that the veteran twirler had strained a tendon in his left leg. He soon recovered from the attack, but it was said that it will be a week or ten days before he will be able to pitch again.

Coombs was just making a successful come-back after being out of the game for two seasons and was regarded as one of Manager Robinson's winning pitchers.
