Charges Made That Umpire Fesler Favors Marysville; League Takes Action Tomorrow

Serious trouble is brewing in the Dauphin-Perry League, following Saturday's Marysville-Dauphin game at Dauphin. Marysville walked from the field in the first half of the first inning when Umpire Fesler, it is said, in a fit of disgust at himself for calling a man safe who was out by at least three feet, explosively relieved his mind by telling Third Baseman Murphy to take the bench.

Murphy, backed by the Dauphin team and with several of the more sportsmanlike Marysville players on his side, refused. The Perry county team, not overanxious to meet Umpire Fesler, gladly walked from the field. On the strength of this action they claim the game.

This is the second time this season that Fesler has caused protested games between Dauphin and Marysville. Newport does not take kindly to his too evident attempts to throw things Marysville's way, either.

R. McBride, of the Rocky Mountain Association, ran a magnificent race against H. P. Drew, the colored sprinter, in the 220-yard dash, and breasted the tap two yards ahead of the champion in 21 seconds, one-fifth of a second better than the existing world's mark.

A. F. Muentzer, of the Olympic Club, bettered the existing world's figures in the 440-yard hurdles which he negotiated in 53 3-5 seconds.

HUSTLE FOR GAMES WITH MAJOR TEAMS

Secretary Douglass Anxious to Land Hughey Jennings; Saturday Games at Toronto

Postponed major league games early in the season is making it almost impossible to schedule exhibition games. Secretary William R. Douglass to date has been unable to book any special features for August, outside of the New York Yankees. High-ey Jennings sent word Saturday that he was unable to play here because of the double-header at Chicago, on August 14.

Will Try Again. As soon as President Edward G. Barrow arranges a transfer of dates, renewed efforts will be made to secure at least three big attractions for August and as many for September.

The Indians play two games at Toronto to-day, and will go to Buffalo tomorrow for four games. Manager Zimmerman is still hopeful that his aggregation will not get too far behind, in order to make a great finish, depending on the home games for a spurt. On Saturday Harrisburg lost the first game, score 8 to 2, and tied up the second score 1 to 1.

The first game was easily won by Toronto, which had no trouble in solving Chabek's delivery after the third frame.
