There may be a number of defendants arraigned for sentence, but the principal purpose of the return of the additional law judge is to conduct the mandamus hearing instituted by Joe Buccell against Jimmy Pavone over the question of the conduct of a bakery at the Derry stone quarries. Both contend the other has violated the sales agreement.

Here, they declare, they were subjected to brutal beatings, confined to filthy quarters, given little food, and that of inferior quality.
