## GOV. BRUMBAUGH AT DEDICATION

Interesting Services at Opening of Palmyra's School Building Today

Palmyra, Pa., Oct. 12.—Governor Martin G. Brumbaugh and other State officials were speakers to-day at the dedication of the Palmyra school building. Gabriel H. Moyer was master of ceremonies. It was a gala day in Palmyra, the room being decorated for the occasion and business places closed at noon.

The program opened this afternoon at 1:30 with a parade of Palmyra school children. The dedicatory program at the new school building started at 2:30 o'clock. Following a selection by the Iroquois band, "Grandioso" by Seitz, the audience sang, America. Invocation was offered by the Rev. E. O. Burtner.
