New York, Nov. 3.—Within two months the Pacific Ocean, from which the American flag has been practically swept through the sale of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's vessels and the transfer to British registry of the vessels of the Robert Dollar line, will have half a dozen freight vessels operating between American and Oriental points. This was the promise made yesterday by Philip Manson, a director of the Pacific and Eastern Steamship Company, which was incorporated in Albany last Friday.
