BROAD INQUIRY INTO GOVERNMENT Economy and Efficiency Commission's Letter Creates Stir on the Hill Few movements made on Capitol Hill in many months have created more stir than the requests of the new State Economy Commission for statements from the heads of each department, bureau, board and commission in the State government as to the manner in which positions were created, what the people do who fill them and how much time is devoted to the duties. The inquiry will be the first to go to the root of the creation of positions. This was touched by the Economy and Efficiency Commission in 1914 and recommendations were that every position be created by statute and payments from contingent funds be abolished as far as they provide for employes. The present inquiry goes clear down the line and there is not a place among the hundreds on Capitol Hill which will not be reported upon. The question regarding the work done and the number of hours taken by each person to do it is believed to be the first movement toward establishing uniform hours on Capitol Hill. Now each department has its own hours. It is probable that a general rule for all offices of the State government will be established. Another question which is likely to receive some thought before being answered is the interrogatory as to the necessity for each position and the exact nature of the duties assigned and performed. The State government is supposed to have about 5,000 persons on the total list, although only about 1,100 are paid by check.
