NEWS OF THE RAILROADS

SUSTAINS AWARD IGNORED BY P. R. R.

Supreme Court Holds it Discriminates and Awards Phila. Co. \$27,000

Washington, Nov. 16.—A decision of the greatest importance, strengthening the hands of the interstate commerce commission in its efforts to regulate the railroads, was given yesterday by the United States Supreme court, which affirmed a decision of the Pennsylvania Federal court, awarding damages of \$27,000 to W. F. Jacoby & Co., of Philadelphia, against the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Discrimination in furnishing freight cars had been charged, Jacoby & Co. had complained to the interstate commerce commission. The commission found there had been discrimination, and ordered the railroad to pay \$21,000, with interest, the total being \$27,000.

Instead of complying with the order the railroad sought to nullify the power of the commission by refusing to pay, and the company was forced to sue under act to regulate commerce, in the Federal district court for Eastern Pennsylvania. A full verdict was rendered by the court, and the railroad appealed to the Third Circuit Court of Appeals, the matter finally coming before the Supreme court.

R. R. CLUB HAS 3,300 MEMBERS

Butler, Pa., Nov. 16.—At the November meeting of the Bessemer and Lake Erie Wagon Club here yesterday it was announced that the organization now has a membership of 1,800. All the members of the club are employees of the Bessemer and Lake Erie railroad, which employs 3,300.

RAILWAY SOLD AT AUCTION

New Orleans, Texas & Mexico Brings \$6,000,000 on Bondholders' Bid

New Orleans, Nov. 16.—The New Orleans, Texas & Mexico Railroad, a subsidiary of the St. Louis & San Francisco, was sold at public auction here by order of Judge Rufus Foster, of the Federal District Court, to Walter L. Taylor, representing the bondholders for \$6,000,000. There were no other bidders.

RATIFY MERGER

Petersburg, Va., Nov. 16.—Seaboard Air Line Railway stockholders to-day ratified the merging of their road and the Carolina, Atlantic & Wisconsin Railway; also the issuance of mortgage bonds to be assumed by the consolidated company.

RAILWAY MEN UNDERPAID?



To Raise Credit of Fifty Millions Here, New Plan

London, Nov. 16.—Preliminary arrangements for an Anglo-American

banking credit to relieve the exchange situation have been completed, the Times understands, although certain formalities have yet to be observed, according to a memorandum issued to bankers yesterday. The plan provides the raising of a

first credit of \$50,000,000 in New York on behalf of eight clearing banks on this side, but other banks here will be allotted participation in the credit, which will be secured by the deposit of securities at the Bank of England.
