Conference Next Week For Mission Education

The great plans and various preparations which have been afoot for several months in readiness for the Missionary Education Conference have finally been completed and the dates for the conference have been announced by Frank Fahnestock, chairman of the committee of arrangements, as being November 22, 23, 24.
The committee which has drawn up plans for the conference comprises Frank Fahnestock, chairman, Mrs. James Fry Bullitt, Miss Sara Nunnaker, who is chairman of the young people's classes, and Miss Alice Hepford, all of whom attended the Silver Bay Conference last summer, from which the plan for holding a missionary conference in our own city originated.
The purpose of the conference is to arouse city-wide interest in the missionary cause and to interest people to attend the Silver Bay Conference, held at Silver Bay every summer during the first part of the month of July. All sessions of the conference will be held in the Pine Street Presbyterian Church.
Among the prominent speakers at the platform meetings will be the Rev. Julius F. Hecker, a Russian, head of the staff of the Settlement and Church of All Nations in New York city. An additional class for Sunday school officers and teachers of the beginners' primary and junior grades will be conducted every afternoon of the conference at 4:30 by Mrs. M. J. Baldwin, State superintendent of elementary Sunday school work. The classes have been arranged and the speakers of the conference chosen after much deliberation on the part of the committee. The conference will be a big thing to the people of our city and it is hoped—and present indications show—that the interest in missionary work will be propagated.
