American Missionary to India Detained as Spy

New Britain, Conn., Nov. 29.—The Rev. Frederick Krieger, of this city who has been engaged in missionary work in British India for many years is being detained in a British prison camp in India on the suspicion that he is a German spy, according to information received today by relatives here.

MAN WHO SWORE VENGEANCE HELD AS MURDERER

Jim Rosa Arrested on Charge of Killing Man Who Stole His Wife

STABBED THIRTY TIMES

Aid Given by Local Police Help Authorities Nab the Suspect

"Jim" Rosa, aged 28 years, an Italian, was arrested Saturday evening at Beacon City, N. Y., charged with the murder of Dominick Tarantina, alias Joe Bellini, a former Harrisburger.

Rosa is the husband of a woman known here as Anna Aronda. Tarantina eloped from Newburgh, N. Y., with Mrs. Rosa, and came to Harrisburg early in October.

While Bellini was waiting in jail for the woman was sent out of the city. Soon after her departure, Tarantina left and was not heard from until the murder. Rosa, the husband, was suspected from the start. He had threatened a number of times to kill the man who ran away with his wife, and was on his way to Harrisburg when arrested in New Jersey for carrying concealed deadly weapons.

WHEAT GOES UP AFTER SEIZURE

American Tank Steamer Seized by German Warship and Cargo of Oil Taken

New York, Nov. 29.—The American oil tank steamer Wico, formerly the German steamer Paula, which sailed from Philadelphia for Stockholm with a cargo of illuminating oil last July, arrived today from Hamburg and Kirkwall and reported having been seized by a German cruiser which took her into Stettin, Germany, where the oil was discharged.

STEAMER BELIEVED LOST

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 29.—The 211-ton steamer Toledo, which left here two weeks ago with a cargo of flour and lumber for Mexico via San Francisco is believed to be lost. Nothing has been heard of the vessel since she passed Cape Flattery last Friday.

HOMELESS POLES ARE DYING BY THOUSANDS FOR WANT OF FOOD

Drastic Relief Measures Necessary to Prevent Wholesale Deaths From Starvation in Warsaw District; Bread Lines and Soup-houses Unable to Supply Enough to Keep the Body and Soul Together; All Industries Paralyzed; Country Districts Are Battle Scarred, Barren and Fire Swept

People Are Living in Huts, Caves and Abandoned Trenches; Epidemics of Disease Superinduced by Unsanitary Conditions and Hunger Sweep Away Thousands; Few Remaining Mothers Are So Under-nourished They Cannot Feed Their Children

Warsaw, Nov. 12, via London, Nov. 29.—Hundreds of thousands of the civil population in the Warsaw district of Poland are suffering for want of food. A considerable percentage of this number still are homeless, living in huts, caves and abandoned trenches.

Such food as is now on hand is being distributed by the Germans under the bread card system, but only potatoes are available in quantities, while there is an acute shortage of dried vegetables, meat fats and condensed milk.

Suffering is especially acute among the families of Russian reservists who formerly received regular payments from the government. Pensioners now are cut off from their former incomes and the Russians are charged with having taken with them the funds of savings bank depositors.

WELLS SPENT \$533.85 Among the late election expense accounts filed this afternoon was the statement of Sheriff Harry C. Wells, successful minority candidate for County Commissioner. He spent \$533.85. He contributed \$300 to the Democratic County Committee.

ELLIOTT-FISHER APPEALS ASSESSMENT Representatives of the Elliott-Fisher Typewriter Company this afternoon appeared before the City Board of Tax Revision and appeals to appeal from the 1916 triennial assessment. The property was valued at \$3,500 an acre; the company considers this too high.

HALF OF TOWN IS BURNED Los Angeles, Nov. 29.—More than half the town of Avalon, on Santa Catalina Island, was destroyed by fire today. Estimates of the loss run as high as \$1,000,000. The fire destroyed the two principal hotels a number of business blocks, the bath house and clubs and damaged the pier and freight houses before it was brought under control.

B. AND O. PLACES EMBARGO ON STEEL Baltimore, Nov. 29.—On account of large freight accumulation at its St. George, Staten Island, terminal, the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad placed an embargo today on iron and steel articles for export through New York.

HUNTER KILLED WHEN HE SLIPPED Hazleton, Pa., Nov. 29.—Francis Bair, of Delano, while hunting for rabbits in the Quakake Valley, near Round Mountain, this afternoon, slipped from a rock on which he was standing. His gun exploded and the load entered his body, instantly killing him.

CLOSE SEVENTY-TWO SALOONS Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 29.—Seventy-two saloons of Hibbing and Chisholm must close their doors immediately as a result of Judge Page Morris' denial in district court today of a temporary injunction restraining agents of the Federal Indian Bureau from enforcing the treaty, law of 1855, declared effective more than a year ago by the United States Supreme Court. The treaty law prohibits the sale of liquor on Indian reservations.
