handle the actual police work and the traffic regulations while the detective work will be in charge of the bureau. That William L. Windsor, Jr., former alderman of the Fourth ward, will be the chief of the bureau is generally conceded. What will be done with Thompson is a question, too, and it is believed that the mayor will agree to retain him in his present place as captain.

The question of the city treasurer-ship is still in the air it was said in municipal circles to-day. City Com-

missioner M. Harvey Taylor and City Chairman Harry F. Oves are running neck and neck for the place, it is understood, although friends of both believe that efforts are being made to create some sort of a split which would rebound to the credit of a "dark horse." Rumor had it to-day that William L. Tunis also would like the treasurer-ship.

In the light of Mayor-elect Meals' friendship for Mr. Tunis a whole lot of folks in civic circles are wondering what the Tunis report may pretend. Mayor-elect Meals and City Commissioners Harry F. Bowman and W. H. Lynch had "a little conference" last night.

The mayor-elect when asked what was discussed gravely said: "Safety-first zones and semaphores." "Signs O' The Times?" "And not possibly appointments?" he was asked.

"Safety-first zones and these standards that Mr. Lynch has secured, I tell you. I came down to ask him about these—where he got them and so on."

"What do you mean by semaphores? Signs?" "Yes, signs, traffic signs. Wouldn't it be a good plan to have our traffic control regulated by a series of semaphores at the more crowded intersections, if we can get them? That's what I wanted to ask Mr. Lynch, too."

Movement of Troops Protects Americans

Washington, Dec. 3.—Movement of more Carranza troops through American territory renders further attack upon American border towns improbable in the opinion of Major General Funston. About 1,000 Carranza troops reached Douglas, Ariz., yesterday, and 1,200 more are due there to-day. General Obregon expects to transfer 5,000 men across American territory in his effort to crush the bands into which Villa's forces have disintegrated.

Governor Ferguson, of Texas, who recently conferred with General Carranza was at the War Department to-day, and Monday will see President Wilson. He was optimistic over the correction of border troubles.

"General Carranza," he said, "is a man of the safe and sane type, a man of intellect and one that I am sure will be able to handle the situation. We had a very cordial conference and his personality impressed me very much."

Duponts Buy Celluloid Plant For \$7,000,000

New York, Dec. 3.—It was announced here to-day that all interests of the Arlington Company, N. J., manufacturers of Pyralin, a celluloid product, had been purchased by the Du Pont de Nemours Powder Company, of Wilmington, Del.

The deal was consummated at a meeting of the Arlington Company directors at which it was announced that the purchase price was between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000. About 2,000 hands are employed at the Arlington plant.
