Invitations Will Be Sent Out Broadcast in Norway, Sweden and Denmark
TO THE HAGUE BY RAIL

Auto Man Will Agree to Go Through Germany Without a Stop; Oscar Behind Time

On Board Steamship Oscar II, via wireless to Cape Race, N. F., Dec. 9.—Tentative plans for the itinerary and preliminary procedure of Henry Ford's party of peace advocates were announced today. At Christiania, Norway, the party will remain three days, and Norwegian delegates will be selected by the expedition of sending out invitations to the president, as was done in the United States. A special train will be dispatched to Stockholm to recruit and transport Swedish delegates, and another special train will bring Danish delegates from Copenhagen. Leaving Scandinavia the party purposes going direct to The Hague by rail, provided Mr. Ford can obtain permission to pass through Germany. He will agree to a nonstop trip. If the Germans will only grant permission to traverse the country. At The Hague, Dutch, Spanish and Swiss members are expected to join the party, and with their arrival permanent organizations will be attempted with a view to bringing peace to the warring nations. After a stormy start which caused much delay, the Oscar II was making good progress today, though she will probably be four days late reaching Christiania.

Ford Pacifist Declares Spirit of Love Stronger Than Military Force

New York, Dec. 9.—A wireless from the steamer Oscar II signed and prepaid by Henry Ford was received here today. The message gave a summary of a speech delivered on board last night by Judge Ben Lindsey, of Denver, in which he declared the spirit of love would be more effective in international politics than military force. Judge Lindsey told the peace advocates of his experience during ten years on the bench, drawing the conclusion that criminals responded more quickly to trust than to shackles and force. He argued against the "preference policy" being a part of his contention on the assertion that fire arms are unknown in the reform prison camps in Colorado, except when they are needed to protect the convicts from persons who desired what he termed "militaristic elements" and deprecated the efforts of force in either cause. A wireless message from Henry Ford, aboard the steamer Oscar II, was received at the White House at Washington today. Mr. Ford asked the President to disregard what he termed inaccurate newspaper accounts of proceedings aboard the Oscar II and said that he would personally inform the President later as to the trans-Atlantic trip.

PARK PLAN SHOULD BE GIVEN THOUGHT

State Officials Attend While Mr. Brunner was the guest of honor and the principal speaker at today's luncheon, there were other notable guests. State Treasurer Robert K. Young and Superintendent of Public Buildings and Grounds Samuel B. Rambo were among those at the table and a host of representative business and professional men of the city. Governor Brumbaugh was expected also but an important out-of-town engagement precluded this. Auditor General A. J. Powell had an important conference with the attorney general which prevented their attendance, too. Mr. Brunner put in some time at the capitol where State Senator Rambo showed him the plans and other data relative to the proposed park extension. The architect said he considered the capitol park zone question was too important to settle hastily. "Careful, Thoughtful Consideration" "This is surely too big a problem to arrive at a decision without careful, thoughtful consideration," said he. "The relation of the city to the State should be given studious thought and you should be in no hurry to arrive at any conclusion until you have given the whole problem the most careful study from every possible angle. Mr. Brunner, during his inspection of the capitol, was not particularly impressed with the Barnard statuary nor with the heavy electrolators, the casings of the standard cabinets or other interior decorations. Mr. Brunner considers the decorations "out of harmony" with the remainder of the handsome entrance and rotunda because of their massiveness. The Barnard statuary, he also considers out of harmony. He called attention rather forcibly to the contrast of the marble statues against the granite structure. Nor did the sculptor's usual idea of endeavoring to work the nudity of the human figure into statuary to adorn the front of a structure like Pennsylvania's Statehouse, especially appeal to Mr. Brunner. the "Front Steps of Harrisburg" to the hills beyond the Susquehanna. "While you have not the congested river front problems which confront some other cities, the use you have made in the development of your water front is splendid." A Well-Ordered City That Harrisburg is a well-ordered city in the way it is laid out and paved, was enthusiastically commented upon by Mr. Brunner. Furthermore he touched upon the admirable way Harrisburg is adopted to solving the problems of social center development. Cleveland, he pointed out, had been compelled to take over whole areas to make way for such development. Harrisburg has them right at hand—waiting to be turned into these modern recreation purposes. In his address before the members of the Harrisburg Club, Mr. Brunner emphasized the opportunity for a great civic center in Harrisburg grouped about the Capitol and the park extending to the east. "What is good for the State is good for the city, and what is good for the city is good for the State," he said, "so it behooves each to co-operate with the other for the benefit of the whole. You have a difficult problem to solve here, but one capable of a big solution. You have the right and I believe you will continue so."

Mr. Brunner said he believes more in moral suasion than in force and that if the citizens as a whole get together and stand behind the city planners, few property owners would have the temerity to defy public opinion so unanimously expressed. The danger lies in lack of public interest and support he said. Teamwork is the important thing in city building. Mr. Brunner made a plea for trees in the business sections. He said Americans shy from trees in front of their stores, but in Europe the people have learned that trees make their business streets more attractive. He called attention to the obelisk at State and Second streets, which he said is "a very good one, evidently entangled in the street car tracks and has been unable to get out." Nevertheless he said that looking up State street from Front, with the obelisk in the center gave a very pleasing view. The architect said that a civic center is absolutely essential to the proper expression of any city and that city planning is nothing more than a program for the future, the success of which depends entirely upon public support. J. Horace McFarland introduced the speaker and J. William Bowman, president of the Chamber of Commerce, thanked Mr. Brunner on behalf of the members. The more than 100 present listened attentively throughout the address and heartily applauded the speaker.
