JUST WHERE IS SPRING TO DANCE

Fountain Will Probably Be Placed at Front and State Streets

The "dance of eternal Spring" after all, may not edit and uplift an eager, watchfully waiting public until next Spring.

Of reasons, there are several. The probable cold weather grouch of the weather man is the first; the question of a harmonious decision of all the members of the newly created city art commission is another; the view City Council may take of the commission's recommendations may be another.

The commission consisting of Park Commissioner M. Harvey Taylor, President E. S. Herman of the City Planning Commission, M. I. Kast, of the Southern Pennsylvania Chapter of American Architects, Mrs. William Henderson of the Civic Club, and J. Horace McFarland, Municipal League, went over all the talked of sites yesterday afternoon with Giuseppe Donato, the sculptor. And then it was agreed that another meeting would be held next Monday afternoon in the park office to decide upon a recommendation.

The fact that at least fifty feet of space will be necessary to include the fountain, the basins and the balustraded enclosure which the sculptor has in mind, eliminated all but two sites. These are the park at Front and State street and the slopes of Reservoir. Other points considered included the grass plot in State just off Second, Twenty-first and Market streets, Harris Park, and the slopes of the old entrance to Reservoir at Walnut and Eighteenth. Mr. Donato declined smilingly but firmly to say what he considered the best point.

That the sculptor favors the River Front Park with the State Capitol in impressive background, as the more desirable site, is generally believed.
