THIRTY-FOUR NOW IN THIRD CLASS

Charters Issued to the Bethlehems Raise the List of Municipalities in State

STATE AFTER ESTATES

Has Over 1,000 Cases Pending in the Courts of the State Because of Insane



Issuance of new charters to the cities of Bethlehem and South Bethlehem by the Secretary of the Commonwealth this week gives Pennsylvania thirty-four cities of the third class, including Lancaster which is operating under a charter granted in 1818, but which is rated as a third class city.

Auto Licenses Pay.—\$212,000 was turned into the State Treasury in the first ten days of December by the State Highway Department as revenue from automobile licenses for 1916, constituting the largest amount ever paid to the Treasury for licenses for the new year up to this time in December.

Demonstration Work.—State orchard demonstration which has been in progress in the State at the rate of from 25 to 30 per day since the latter part of November will close the end of the coming week. The demonstrations have been chiefly for pruning and control of San Jose scale and similar pests.

State After Estates.—The State of Pennsylvania is prosecuting in the courts of over fifty counties of the State something like 1,000 claims against the estates of persons who are confined in State institutions as lunatics and whose property is sufficient to pay for their maintenance.

First Monday Cases.—The Public Service Commission will hold its first Monday hearings on applications for approval of contracts between municipalities and public utilities, agreements involving public service, incorporations and similar business on next Monday and thereafter the day will be devoted to such matters.

Insurance Fund Work.—The State Workmen's Insurance Fund has so far progressed toward organization that the rates will soon be announced and the issuance of policies will follow very soon.

Officials Kept Busy.—The demand for information about the State Workmen's Insurance Commission and the features of the State Insurance Fund has caused the officials of the two boards to take to the platform and to do some tall hustling in order to attend to their office work and to make speeches.



Electric Locomotives Haul Heavy Trains Up Grade

Butte, Mont., Dec. 11.—Successful final tests have been made on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad with the electrical transportation of trains over the heavy grades of the Rocky Mountains. A trainload of 2,200 tons was pulled by three of the heaviest steam locomotives of the Mallet type in the service of the St. Paul system, and then a load of 2,000 tons was drawn over the same grade by two of the large electric freight locomotives. The greater ease with which the electric locomotives pulled the heavier load, stopping on the grade and then gathering speed, caused much satisfaction to the railroad men.
