

Brazil Reduces Duties on Imports From N. A.

Reading, Pa., Jan. 14.—The Rev. Christian S. Haman, a former bishop of the United Evangelical Church and in the ministry for over sixty years, during which he was presiding elder over twenty years, died here today. He preached a total of over 10,000 sermons. He was 83 years old.

ELECTION CASES GO OVER
