Scranton, Pa., Jan. 19.—All the mines of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company were idle recently as a last tribute to Arthur C. LaMonte, general manager of the Coal Mining department. Mr. LaMonte, who was 46 years old, had been with the company since 1888. He rose from a minor position in the mine engineering corps to be its head, and succeeded Col. R. A. Phillips as general manager only a few weeks ago. Mr. LaMonte spent last Thursday in the mines. Early Friday morning he suffered a paralytic stroke, and the end came at 19:15 Sunday night.
