Has 307 Senior Societies, 105 Junior, and 15,000 Members; Miss Nell Liddick Chosen Recording Secretary

Keystone Leagues of Christian Endeavor with a membership of 307 senior societies, 105 junior societies and 3,255 junior members in Pennsylvania, are doing good work in the upbuilding and supporting the Christian Endeavor movement in this State. The first general convention, held in Chicago, Ill., September 23-30, 1915, exceeded the highest anticipations of all. The inspiration of this great gathering will be felt for many years throughout the United Evangelical Church. A second convention will be held in this city immediately preceding the general conference of 1918. Among the distinguished workers are the Rev. J. Q. A. Johnston, president of the managing board; the Rev. W. E. Peffley, Lewistown, general secretary of Sunday school and Keystone League of Christian Endeavor; Bishop K. L. C. E. Journal, and Mrs. W. M. Stanford, A. M. D., editor of the Evangelical Endeavorer; J. D. Killheffer, Philadelphia, president East Pennsylvania conference; Keystone League of Christian Endeavor; U. F. Swengel, D. D., this city, trustee of the United Society of Christian Endeavor; and Bishop W. H. Fouke, D. D., Natick, Mass., former editor of the K. L. C. E. Journal, and many others of this denomination interested in the coming State Christian Endeavor convention, July 11-14.

Miss Liddick, convention secretary Miss Nell M. Liddick, a member of the Park Street United Evangelical Church for fourteen years, has been chosen as recording secretary of the general convention committee, who will record all of the proceedings of the business sessions of the committee at the great convention to be held in July. She is very interested in all of the work of the church.
