REAL ESTATE

File Nineteen Reasons Why 'Hardscrabble' View Shouldn't Be Confirmed

'Hardscrabble' property owners have filed nineteen exceptions to the legality of the city's procedure in the condemnation of that section, along with twenty-two appeals of individuals from the awards of damages allowed by the board of viewers.

The exceptions declare the report 'informal, illegal and void' and the petitioners in the formal petitions of exception, are:

That the house and property values are not separated in the report; Council doesn't authorize by ordinance the opening and grading of the street, but merely directs the city solicitor to proceed; the properties in question are not designated on an official plan of the city; the method of making the proposed improvement is not specified; questions the viewers' award only for property that has been improved since 1871; the abandonment of the old toll road of which Front street between Herr and Calder streets is a part, is not set forth; that the road in question was never vacated, although laid out in 1860; that the whole proceeding is illegal, because it is not an effort to open the street, but to acquire the land for park purposes; that the city recognized the opening of the street by charter; that the paying assessment; that the city has filed no bonds to cover the damage.

NEW FRONT STREET RESIDENCE PLANNED BY BERGMAN, REPORT

Maguire it is understood, is considering the erection of a new residence on his lot at Front and Woodbine streets.

Of Foreign Birth, but Not Hyphenated Americans

Yesterday at 2 o'clock at his late home, 1056 South Cameron street, approaching the extreme southern end of the city, funeral services of Thomas Coleman were conducted by the Rev. Robert Runyan, pastor of Vine Street Methodist Church, assisted by the Rev. Richard H. Coleburn, a former pastor, and Dr. S. C. Swallow, a longtime friend.

This afternoon at 2 o'clock at the farmhouse home of his daughter, Mrs. Jefferson S. Hargest, above Riverside, approaching the extreme northern end of the city, funeral services of Richard Reese is being conducted by the Rev. Mr. Seachrist, pastor of Riverside Methodist Church, assisted by Dr. S. C. Swallow.

Mr. Coleman was born in England nearly 77 years ago, and came to this country at the age of 21, nearly 56 years ago. Mr. Reese was born in Wales nearly 85 years ago, and came to America at the age of five, or nearly 80 years ago. There was, therefore, about 8 years difference in their ages.

Though one was of English and the other of Welsh antecedents, there was much in common in their occupation as iron workers, in their traits of character for integrity, industry, economy with liberality, energy with perseverance and loyalty to cherished friends. Both belonged to that large class of foreign-born American citizens. Among the more than fifteen millions now in this country, who have lost none of their love for their native heather in their devotion to their adopted home, America first was their motto, and a democratic republic their ideal form of government.


MRS. KATE R. MALICK


