Ebensburg to Harrisburg, is through Hollidaysburg and thence to Water Street which is almost all permanent macadam.

Editorially the Cambria Freeman, of Ebensburg, says:

"No matter what chambers of commerce may say, the man who is going some place to not make a long detour over bad roads when the direct way is permanently improved.

"And a greater joke is in including Indiana in this route. Indiana is off the route, and its position will keep it off. The direct William Penn road from Johnstown and from Munday is through Blairsville to New Alexandria; and all the palaverings of eastern road constructionists can't change the fact.

"It is a mighty good thing that Governor Brumbaugh is interested in this route, and will see to it that the direct roads are used. The Governor may be expected to use his influence so that every two-by-four town in Central Pennsylvania is not included in the route.

"When the eastern road specialists learn that a short road is the straightest distance between two points—when they learn that small towns and small cities can reach this short road through the construction of laterals, then this road proposition will begin to take form."

MORE HOGS BEING RAISED IN STATE

Department of Agriculture Bulletins Show Attention Also Given to Potatoes

Pennsylvania is raising more hogs and potatoes according to the statistics of the State Department of Agriculture, who note from county reports that there is a big demand for more seed potato and that a bigger acreage than known for many years is being outlined for the tubers in spite of the loss sustained last year. There are signs in every county of an increased acreage, says a bulletin of the department, and farmers are no longer confining themselves to exchanging with neighbors, they are out to buy for seed.

In regard to the hogs the Department bulletin says that thirty-five counties of the State now have more hogs than at this time last year. Monroeville and Sullivan having six per cent more; Chester, York, Snyder and Clinton five per cent; Blair, Center, Armstrong, Carbon, Clarion, Huntingdon and Lancaster four per cent increase. The only counties showing a marked decrease were Montgomery,

HYGIENE CONFAB WILL BE NOTABLE

Many Medical Men Are Coming to This City For the Meeting Tomorrow

More than 100 physicians from all sections of Pennsylvania interested in occupational diseases and accident prevention work, will attend the conference to be held at the Capitol to-morrow by the Division of Industrial Hygiene and Engineering of the Department of Labor and Industry. Industrial plants of the State will be represented by their physicians and surgeons engaged in safety first work. The workmen's compensation law as it affects physicians will be explained at the conference.

Dr. John R. McAllister, president of the State Medical Society of Pennsylvania, will give the address of welcome.

Dr. Francis D. Patterson, chief of the Division of Industrial Hygiene and Engineering, will discuss the laws of Pennsylvania relating to industrial hygiene and will also discuss lead poisoning.

Paul N. Furman, chief of the Bureau of Statistics and Information, will explain the procedure a physician should follow in reporting accident compensation cases to the Department of Labor and Industry. Dr. Elizabeth B. Bricker, medical inspector of the Hygiene Division, will discuss asphyxiation and resuscitation. Discussions will be part of each session.

STOUGH SLANDER SUITS

Hazleton, Pa., Feb. 16.—Four slander suits of \$50,000 each against Dr. Henry Stough, the evangelist, are listed for the term of court beginning March 14 at Wilkes-Barre, and continuing a week apart until April 4. Dr. Stough's attorneys appealed to the Luzerne court last summer, after three arbitrators had made an award of \$2,700 in favor of the defendant, Cullen.
