PITCHER PAGEANT TO BE ELABORATE

Carlisle Preparing For Unveiling of Monument to Heroine of Monmouth in June

Carlisle, Pa., Feb. 18.—Arrangements for the ceremonies to accompany the unveiling of the monument to Molly Pitcher, the heroine of Monmouth, here on June 28, have been placed in the hands of an executive committee of 25 citizens of Carlisle. They will work out the details and present the plans to the members of the State commission when the latter body meets here next month. The committee has elected the following officers: President, E. S. Manning, Newville; vice-president, D. W. McBride, Carlisle; secretary, R. W. Woods, Carlisle; assistant, W. A. Rupp, Carlisle; treasurer, William Kronenberg.

COL. J. L. WRIGHT DIES AT COLUMBIA

Lineal Descendant of Town's Founder, War Veteran, Ex-Postmaster and Councilman

Special to the Telegraph Columbia, Pa., Feb. 18.—Colonel John L. Wright, a lineal descendant of Samuel Wright, founder of Columbia and grandson of John Wright, who for many years represented Lancaster county in the Assembly, died at his home here Wednesday night, aged 78 years. Colonel Wright, like his ancestors, was for many years a prominent factor in the political life of Columbia, having served a term as postmaster, under President Harrison, from 1890 to 1894. He also served as market master for a period of 13 years, and was a member of council for one term, being chosen president of that body. He was stricken with the illness that caused his death, fourteen months ago, while presiding over that body. Colonel Wright was born in the old Wright mansion in South Second street, which was erected by his ancestors, and which was used as a fortress during the French and Indian war, and after Braddock's defeat in Western Pennsylvania. He served in the Civil War and was a member of General Welsh Post, No. 118, G. A. R. of Columbia. His wife and five children survive. Colonel Samuel Wright, of Columbia, the oldest native-born citizen and William Wright, of Conshohocken; Mrs. James W. Millin and Mary Wright, of Columbia, are surviving brothers and sisters. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

Another is that it will cut down imports of luxuries.
