

### BIG COUNTRY CLUB PLAN ANNOUNCED

with country clubs to be admirably adapted for a building and big golf course, is just above the Rockville bridge and it is the idea to have the club operate its own motor bus line, the financial program is now being worked out and it is the hope to have the new clubhouse ready by April 1 of next year. Meanwhile the present grounds will be used and events held on them this summer.

The notice issued to the members of the club is as follows: "Your board of governors desires to

announce that a new site has been selected for your club and that an option on same has been secured. The proposed site consists of more than one hundred acres; is part of the Fort Hunter Farm, and is situated about two miles north of the present clubhouse and about one-quarter mile east of the river.

This site was selected by a committee, appointed by your president, after several months of hard work, during which time many properties were visited, examined and carefully considered from every viewpoint. The final recommendation of the site committee was unanimously adopted by your board of governors and will soon be presented to you for approval.

Before a decision was finally

reached by your board this property and one other under consideration were examined by William Flynn, the well-known golf architect, who reported most enthusiastically on the Fort Hunter property. He said, in part: "This is the most beautiful site for a golf course that has ever come under the observation of the writer, and I am convinced that if selected it would become very popular."

"The property is sufficiently large to provide an 18-hole golf course and six tennis courts. It lies on high ground between two spurs of the mountain and commands a magnificent view of the river for many miles, and is so protected from encroachment in the future as to make it most desir-

able from the viewpoint of a country club. "Through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Rely, arrangements have been made for a good-sized skating pond during the winter months. Mr. and Mrs. Rely have also generously given the club certain lands which will greatly add to the value of the property under consideration. "The new site is easily reached by motor, and a committee is now working on plans to meet members using the Rockville trolley line at the present terminus of the line; or the committee may perfect a plan to carry passengers from Harrisburg to the club. In any event, it is thought that the running time to the new site will not exceed the time taken to reach the

clubhouse by more than ten minutes, and no walking will be required. "In order to finance the purchase of the property, the building of the clubhouse, the laying out of golf links, tennis courts, etc., and to meet all the other expenses necessary to completely equip a country club, a considerable sum of money will be necessary. To raise the necessary funds, your board has appointed a committee, of which Lesley McCreath is chairman. This committee will explain to you in person or through subsequent communication their plan for financing the new club, and it is hoped that all the members of the club will generously support the plan adopted and thereby assure a larger, better and more attractive country club for Harrisburg. "The board fully expects that a new

clubhouse can be erected and the new grounds put in shape by April 1, 1917. Meanwhile the old golf links can be used, as our lease runs for another year. The part of the old building not destroyed by fire is being rebuilt and will be ready by early Spring. The men's locker room will be repaired and the old bowling alleys will be converted into a public reception room, ladies' locker room and kitchen."

SHREDDED FISH The Chinese use chopsticks instead of knives and forks as we do and consequently they cut all their food in small bits before it is served at table. Many of their stews are excellent, though sometimes too highly flavored for our western taste. They

also make good baked dishes. Try this one of shredded fish when you have cold fish left over: Any good sized fish will do, but cod or halibut are particularly good. Shred the fish up very fine. Mix with it about half as much again of cold boiled rice, add a cooked onion cut in slices and a couple of pieces of red peppers. The canned red peppers are very good. So far all is simple, but to have this dish right much depends on the baking pan and the oven. Have ready an enameled ware baking pan and a hot oven. Butter the pan, put in the mixture, pour over it a cup of milk into which an egg has been quickly beaten and place at once in the oven. Serve as soon as it is cooked.
