STEWARDS KEPT NO ACCOUNTS

Cumberland County Auditors Order Investigation of Poor Board's Finances

Special to the Telegraph Carlisle, Pa., Feb. 22.—Alleging that because of imperfect records the accounts of the former treasurer and steward of the Cumberland county poor board cannot properly be balanced, the board of county auditors has engaged special counsel and is conducting an investigation into the items of expense in the reports submitted to them.

The former board of poor directors was democratic and was composed of Jacob Ruth, of Mechanicsburg, and David W. Sunday, of Middlesex, Democrats, and Samuel M. Hertzler, of Mechanicsburg, Republican. J. E. Shettle, of Mechanicsburg, was the former treasurer. George E. Lloyd, of Mechanicsburg, and E. M. Eldridge, of Carlisle, represent the former poor directors. The auditors have adjourned for ten days and then will continue the investigation of the case.
