STOCK INCREASED MANY MILLIONS

Business Activity, Due to Heavy Iron and Steel Orders, Reflected at Capital

Business activity, due in a large measure to the heavy orders from abroad for iron and steel and other products, together with the big domestic demands, is being reflected in the filing of notices of increase of stock or debt by Pennsylvania corporations expanding to meet the business offered them. In the last six months probably more such notices have been filed at the State Capitol than in any similar period and the bulk of them have been from concerns handling iron or steel. Very few public service companies have increased stock or debt.

The aggregate of the notices of stock increases filed runs away into the millions, some of the coal companies increases entered being in hundreds of thousands alone. Since the first of the year over twenty iron and steel corporations have filed notices of increases, foundry and machine companies being the most numerous in that class.

In the same time a number of concerns which had been operating as joint stock or partnerships or plants which had been owned by individuals have been incorporated and charters have been granted to over thirty electric companies.
