PLAYS AND PLAYERS

The next progressive step in the advance march of the motion picture industry might very well be a regulation of the musical accompaniments to the pictures that are thrown on the screen. In some of the towns and cities where orchestras are indispensable to the movie theaters, many a picture has been away from an otherwise enjoyable production by the terrible nature of the music. Cecil De Mille, the producer of the Lasky Company, is of the opinion that the old adage that half a loaf is better than none may apply to music, but not to motion pictures, and he has taken up the cudgel against the automatic organ and the brass band in an effort to bring the standard up to within speaking distance of the orchestra as it now exists for the legitimate productions, meaning the stage.

"Peggy" has been drawing enormous crowds ever since it was first released, which was just about a week or so ago, and the fascinating Billie Burke is pleasing everybody with her tomboyish tricks. In this story she shocks a God-fearing Scotch community with her wild pranks, and the comedy is said to be very entertaining. It will probably reach this city eventually.

"Charlie" Chaplin has signed up for \$10,000 a week. There doesn't seem to be much doubt about it. The Mutual Film Company is the concern that has tied him up, rumor hath it, and the rumor seems to have been confirmed. His plan, as one wag says, is to spend his nights in the vault of the Grand Trust Company, for safe keeping. "Charlie" is now "Mr." Chaplin.

A mysterious exclusiveness is being maintained at the Vitaphone Hollywood Studios in the preparation of a photograph which it is understood has been written by Jack London. Little more is known about it except that William Duncan, star of "The Chalice of Courage," will probably play the lead.

Albert Spalding, the great American violinist, believed by many authorities to be the foremost violinist in this country, will come to the Orpheum Theater on Friday, March 17, assisted by Loretta Del Valle, the well-known prima donna. It will be of great interest to Harrisburg theatergoers to have the opportunity of comparing the coming artist with Mischa Elman and Fritz Kreisler, both of whom delighted audiences in Harrisburg earlier in the season.

LOCAL THEATERS

"Uncle Tom's Cabin"
Kibble's mammoth scenic and spectacular \$20,000 revival of the great and celebrated masterpiece of Harriet Beecher Stowe, entitled "Uncle Tom's Cabin," will be given at the Orpheum to-morrow, matinee and evening. It is one of the most interesting and heart-rending plays ever placed upon the stage, and will probably live forever in the memory of the theatergoing public. Wm. H. Kibble, the enterprising manager, has taken great pains in staging and producing the original version of Mrs. Stowe's beautiful story. The company this season numbers over twenty people, ten of whom are colored, engaged to fill out the many pictures of the play and introduce their old and new songs, dances and plantation stunts.

Wilfred Lucas has excellent support in a notable cast in presenting "Acquitted," the Triangle Fine Arts play, that will be presented for the last time at the Colonial to-day. Along with this dramatic feature Charles Merray stars in a Keystone comedy, "His Hereafter," on the same offering. Owing to the new arrangement in its picture presentation, that of changing the program three times weekly, instead of two, the Colonial management is announcing the newest Fox feature, "A Soldier's Oath," with William Farnum in the dramatic attraction for to-morrow and Thursday. As has been previously advertised, the Triangle play will be the same releases as heretofore, but they will be shown for two days only instead of three. Monday and Tuesday are the same days, Wednesday and Thursday will be Fox Feature days, and again on Friday and Saturday the Triangle features will hold forth. "A Soldier's Oath," with the popular William Farnum, is a story of love, honor and the struggle of a man and woman hearts. The winsome Dorothy Bernard will play "The woman in the case."

Far from the average Oriental attraction is the act of the Tschang Yung Troupe, five of the most sensational Chinese artists in the world, who are appearing at the Majestic theater as the feature of the bill for the first half of the week. The Chinese do some work in acrobatics and juggling, and his offering are introduced such as hanging by their ankles. Another treat of this offering is the turn of the star Stanley Trio, two men and a woman, who do a happy melange of comedy stunts on the bounding wire. Marie Russell is a character comedienne, who can put the latest song in her across the footlights at face value. Sampson and Douglas are a pair of singing comedians, and The Balkins offer something interesting in a vocal way. Keystone comedy and a Mary Pickford feature are the movies for the first half of the week.

A large and appreciative audience witnessed the first showing of Geraldine Farrar, the noted prima donna, in "Temptation," at the Regent to-day. The actress, who was seen yesterday, and the same will be shown to-day for the first time. The statement that Geraldine Farrar is the type that can play only heavy dramatic roles is repudiated in her second production, "The Temptation," and those who saw her splendid performance as the half-wild gypsy in the Lasky production of "Carmen" will receive an agreeable surprise. As the struggling young opera singer in love with the penniless composer, Miss Farrar shows the lovable side of her wonderful character. To-morrow and Thursday - Daniel Frohman presents Mary Pickford in "The Foundling," on the Paramount program. A number of very human touches are skillfully contained in this feature and delicately suggested by the boundless art of Mary Pickford. When, as the castaway, after years of hardship and suffering, of loneliness and destitution, she crosses the path of her father, from whom she had been separated since babyhood, the drama reaches one of its most tender climaxes. And when the father, who had loved his wife so greatly that he sent their child away when its birth robbed the mother of her life, looks down into the eyes of the daughter, for whom in after years he had longed and yearned, and asks her if she could forgive a daddy who had been so cruel to her, she not realizing yet that this man is her own father, replies, "I could forgive anybody anything if I only had a daddy."

Society weakness and their effect on a young, impressionable girl who later, when she reaches the full stature of womanhood, realizes the hollowness of it all, and does her best to make amends for her foolishness, is the story by Roy L. McCardell, underlying the big Equitable feature, "The Question," which is appearing at the Victoria Theater to-day, with Marguerite Leslie in the stellar part. Intent upon her social pleasures, she marries a man who loves children, and the disastrous results of her preferring dogs, cards, parties, and other amusements of a society existence, to the normal existence of a home with a loving family, are presented. Her awakening to a realization of the evil she has wrought through her selfishness, and her brave acceptance of its results, with her supreme effort at recovering the beauty of life which she has cast away, give the star an opportunity for some intense dramatic work. Warren Kerrigan, a handsome and talented screen artist, will be presented in the startling "Adventures of O'Rourke."
