Dauphin Poor Board Cuts Maintenance From 40 to 25 Per Capita

Dauphin county's poor board has reduced the per capita allowance for the care of the youngsters and during the first two months of 1916 the present board followed this precedent. Since working out its efficiency and economy plan however, the board decided that the allowance could easily be reduced. At present Dauphin county maintains about 85 children in various institutions including the Children's Industrial Home, Day Nursery, Associated Aids, Children's Aid Society of Pennsylvania, House of St. Michaels and All Angels of Philadelphia and several other homes.
