

Washington, March 8.—The Senate late yesterday confirmed the nomination of Newton D. Baker, ex-Mayor of Cleveland to be Secretary of War. Unanimous commendation of Mr. Baker's appointment was expressed by cabinet members at the cabinet meeting. General Hugh L. Scott, Secretary of War ad interim, told the President that the selection had been very favorably received among army officers.

BREWERS "FIND" MORE RECORDS

Announcement Follows Postponement of Hearing Before Grand Jury Until Next Week

Pittsburgh, March 8.—Reports reached government agents yesterday that another batch of "additional records," both of the United States and Pennsylvania brewers' associations, had been found and will be submitted shortly. This caused a new interpretation to be put on yesterday's action in the United States district court, when the contempt hearings in the federal grand jury probe of the alleged brewery-politics partnership were put over from Thursday of this week to Wednesday of next week.

If more records are produced it will be the third time the brewery associations have submitted records of the kind subpoenaed and which it was first testified had been destroyed. Each previous time counsel for the brewers said the records, which they declared they did not believe were called for in the subpoena, were produced merely "in an excess of caution," as four brewery association officials were under contempt charges for failure to produce subpoenaed records.

This report, coming after the day's court action, it was pointed out last night, may mean that the brewery association will try to keep the case, as originally started, confined to them, and protect the brewing companies, seventy-two of which were indicted last Friday for alleged violation of the federal corrupt practices act.

Judge W. H. S. Thomson, in the United States district court, yesterday on request of counsel for the brewery associations, postponed from Thursday to next Wednesday final arguments on contempt proceedings against John Gardiner and Edwin A. Schmidt, of Philadelphia, president and treasurer, respectively, of the Pennsylvania Brewers' Association, and Gustav W. Lembeck, of Jersey City, and Hugh F. Fox, of New York, treasurer and secretary of the United States Brewers' Association.

One Dollar Is Price of Murder in New York

New York, March 8.—After indictments charging attempted murder had been returned yesterday against four men alleged to have been implicated in the shooting of a guard employed by manufacturers affected by the shirtmakers' strike, Assistant District Attorney Dooling declared the prisoners had informed him they had been hired for \$100 by the shirt makers' union "to beat up and kill strike breakers." Richard Harrison, one of the quartet, admitted, according to Mr. Dooling, that he had "agreed to shoot anyone desired for a dollar."

Military Course Its Duty to Nation, Says Princeton
