## THREE DAYS FOR MOLLY PITCHER

### To Enlarge Celebration at Time of Unveiling of State Monument at Carlisle

Carlisle, Pa., March 24. — The executive committee in charge of the celebration to accompany the unveiling of the State monument to Molly Pitcher here in June is contemplating extending the affair to embrace two or possibly three days, instead of one, as first planned. Acceptance by many organizations of invitations to be present, with a variety of features to be introduced are among the reasons for the proposed extension.

Military maneuvers, a parade and pageant with the unveiling ceremonies will be featured. Indian pupils will take part in the pageant, to be of an elaborate historical nature. Efforts will be made to interest the National Woman Suffrage Association in the affair in honor of the "First American Suffragist" as Molly Pitcher is sometimes known.

### FREIGHT TRAFFIC HEAVY

Freight movement over the Pennsylvania Railroad for the first three weeks of March, as noted at eight observation points, was \$22,150 cars, increase 112,166 cars, and the daily average movement 30,162 cars, increase 5,389, or 21.8 per cent. Total movement passed Lewistown Junction was 72,71 cars, increase, 14,239 cars.

### Freight Wreck Ties Up Philadelphia Division Line

In a freight wreck last night at Buzard's Point, on the low-grade branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad, twenty-three cars were derailed. No one was injured. Traffic to and from Enola was tied up until this morning. A broken brake rigging caused the wreck. The tracks were torn up for a distance of 200 feet.
