ENGINEER'S PART IN WAR GAME IS TOLD AT BANQUET
Two Hundred Members of Engineers' Society Celebrate Twelfth Anniversary

Over two hundred members of the Engineers' Society of Pennsylvania and their guests assembled at the Harrisburg Club Saturday night to celebrate in banquet form the twelfth anniversary of the founding of the club and to do honor to the president, R. Boone Abbott, who was recently promoted to be superintendent of the Shamokin division of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway. Mr. Abbott, who was the first speaker, proposed a toast to the future growth of the society and made an attempt to resign from the presidency because of his removal from this city to Tamaqua, but a vociferous refusal on the part of the banqueters caused him to reconsider his decision.

Frederick W. Fleitz, former Deputy Attorney General, was one of the guests of honor and made a corking speech on the efficiency of the engineer and preparedness as being practically synonymous. He expanded his subject and talked very interestingly on the present world situation, linking all with the great part which the engineer is playing, and going into the history of engineering from the building of the citadel of Thebes to the harnessing of our own Niagara Falls. He declared that the American people are putting into effect, from the President down, men who are inefficient; that we must amalgamate the people into a united whole whose individual interests are subjugated to the general good; that the system of democratic government has been seriously questioned in this war, and that too long have we worshipped the golden calf of individual license. "We are not too proud to fight; we ought not to be too proud to learn and to obey the laws," he said. His reference to Theodore Roosevelt brought a storm of applause.

Mr. Reynolds speaks. Henderson Gilbert was toastmaster and when the time came to introduce J. V. W. Reynolds he paid a great compliment to the man who for many years has been in charge of the Pennsylvania Steel Works and who was the first president of the Engineers' Society, back in 1904. A silver loving cup was presented to Mr. Reynolds by the society and he responded with a few words of thanks and a number of reminiscences.

Flavel W. Wright and Thomas Earle spoke in the absence of President Agnew T. Dice, of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway, and Quincy Bent, general manager of the Pennsylvania Steel Company, who were unable to be present. Colonel John Biddle likewise sent his regrets. Mr. Wright talked about the associations and relations of men with one another and Mr. Earle sounded the keynote of co-operation in the work of the society.

Rise and Fall of Boone Abbott
There was much enthusiasm at the banquet and a number of clever stunts had been arranged which kept the fun at a high pitch. The burlesqued history of the rise of one Boone Abbott was portrayed in alleged moving pictures which offered a splendid opportunity for the histrionic talents of Henderson Gilbert, Theodore E. Seelye, Farley Gannett, Edward Bevan and Henry Evans, who regaled the company with startlingly jerky presentations of the successive steps in the advance progress to fame of the society's president.

The hall was beautifully decorated with American flags and the society's shield. Updegrave's orchestra furnished the music. There was much singing and the toastmaster did not allow things to slow up for a minute. With references to the fourth dimension as being typified in one of the speakers, and with repeated quotations from Irvin Cobb, he kept the diners in constant state of pleasant enjoyment.
