**STEELTON NEWS**  
E. B. SCHEAFFER  
VETERAN WRITER

Middletown Man at Seventy-one Is Active Newspaper Contributor

E. B. Scheaffer, of Middletown, a life-long resident of Dauphin county, who recently celebrated his seventy-first birthday, has in his possession a copy of the Harrisburg Daily Telegraph dated Friday, October 2, 1857. The paper is a four sheet edition, five columns wide. Three of the columns on the front page are made up of advertising matter and the other two of a resolution proposing amendments to the constitution of the Commonwealth. On the second page is a proclamation by Governor James Pollock calling for a joint session of the State Senate and House of Representatives for the purpose of dealing with the serious financial and business crisis of that year. The third and last pages contain principally all advertising matter. The paper was published every day except Sunday by George Berzantia Company, Third street near Walnut.

The relic is highly prized by Mr. Scheaffer, who is a veteran newspaper man of fifty years' experience. He first engaged in the profession in 1868 with the Weekly Trumpet, published at Elizabethtown by the late B. H. Lehman. In the early 70's he wrote country news for the Harrisburg Telegraph when George Berner was editor. For the past twenty years Mr. Scheaffer has written the "Bible Analysis" or exposition on the International Sunday school lesson, for the Philadelphia Record. He is regarded an authority on Bible matters.

**Steelton Ready For Big Arbor Day Fete; 2,000 to Participate**

Arrangements for Steelton's big Arbor Day celebration to-morrow have been completed by committees from the Municipal League, the school authorities and borough officials.

By permission of the School Board the 2,000 pupils in the borough schools will participate in special exercises in the various buildings in the morning. These programs will be arranged to instill greater love for trees and all outdoors in the minds of the students.

While the students are holding these exercises workmen from the borough highway department and a squad of laborers paid by public-spirited citizens will dig holes for trees and clear away underbrush in Luther R. Keller park. This work will be superintended by Emory Hamilton, of the Henry Hill Nursery Company. In the afternoon the school children and many others will assemble in the park to plant young trees.

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

William H. Keller, of Lancaster, first deputy attorney general and Senator William J. Burke, of Pittsburgh, will accompany Governor Brumbaugh on his speech making tour of Blair county on Saturday. They will take the places of Emerson Collins, of Williamsport, deputy attorney general and Congressman John R. K. Scott, of Philadelphia. The Governor is speaking to-night in Boston and will arrive here to-morrow afternoon, leaving Saturday morning at 7:55 for Blair county, his first stop being Altoona.

The Governor's itinerary may be revised again next week. There are several open dates.

Representatives of the Seventeenth Congressional district Republican organization are meeting here to-day to discuss the delegate fight. They plan to oppose the Brumbaugh delegates vigorously.

The Pittsburgh Gazette-Times says to-day that Senator Penrose is very confident of the result and makes this statement: "Senator Penrose declined to discuss the State political situation more than to say that 90 per cent. of the members of the Republican State Committee is expected to elect him." The committee is expected to meet in Harrisburg on Saturday morning at 10:30 a. m. and will elect a national committeeman for Pennsylvania at its meeting on the last day of May.

demurrer revoked April 6 be again reinstated. May 8 was fixed for the hearing.

The demurrer was set aside April 6, claims the Exchange, at the petition of a committee of three members of the organization, who acted without the knowledge or sanction of the corporate body. This committee was induced to pray for the setting aside the demurrer, the Exchange contends, at the instigation of Deputy Attorney General Horace W. Davis, who promised the three individuals consideration and immunity in the Allegheny courts, where indictments have been found against them on charges of bucketshopping.

The committee included George M. Davis, Alexander L. Munro and C. S. Rampanelli. In the petition which this committee filed asking for the setting aside of the demurrer, it is stated that the petition was authorized at a special meeting of eighteen members of the Exchange, presided over by F. N. Heilik, vice-president.

Special significance is attached to today's action in the local courts, according to Attorney Kent from the fact that members of the alleged bucketshop corporation in question are due to be arraigned Monday in the Federal courts on charges of using the United States mails to defraud.
