Mayor Riddle Loses to Hotel Proprietor

Atlantic City, N. J., May 10. — William Riddle, mayor of Atlantic City since the commission form of government was adopted in 1911, was defeated at yesterday's election of a new city commission. He ran 329 votes behind Charles D. White, a hotel proprietor, who was low man among the five successful candidates, all of whom were supported by Harry Racharach, leader of the opposition, and who was re-elected a member of the commission.
W. Frank Sooy, a young attorney, received the highest vote with a total

vote of 5,490. The other successful candidates were Dr. Jesse B. Thompson and Albert Beyer.
Harry Racharach, who is a brother of Congressman Isaac Racharach, will be elected mayor by the members of the new commission when they organize and take office on May 14.

Delegates Elected by Maryland Republicans

The delegates-at-large named are: Walter E. Miller, of Wisconsin county; General Felix Agnus, of Baltimore; Dr. J. McPherson Scott, of Hagerstown, and Ovington E. Weller, of Baltimore.

Three Applicants For Every Convention Seat

Chicago, Ill., May 10. — Three applications have been made for every one of the 11,000 tickets to the Republican National Convention here next month, according to Frederick W. Upham, chairman of the local committee on arrangements, on his

return from French Lick, Ind. In round numbers the tickets will be divided as follows:
One thousand delegates, one ticket each.
One thousand alternates, one ticket each.
Seven hundred press tickets.
Chicago's share as convention city, 2,210.
Members of subcommittee on convention 2,220 (200 each).
Members of National Committee, 780 (15 each).
Each presidential candidate 140.
The Chicago committee has placed its tickets on sale at \$50 each to make up the fund of \$100,000 which the city subscribed for the convention.
Seats for the Progressive party convention have been placed on sale at prices ranging from \$10 to \$25.

TICKETS FOR BACKERS OF CONVENTION FUND

St. Louis, May 10.—Seats at the Democratic National Convention, which meets in the St. Louis Coliseum June 14, will not be sold by the local committee on arrangements, but will be distributed by a secret committee of three among the contributors to the \$100,000 convention fund. The number of contributors was 4,267. A total of 6,099 seats will be available for spectators.

LIQUOR REVENUE \$256,000,000

Louisville, Ky., May 10.—One-third of the Federal government's revenue in 1914 was derived from the liquor industries, declared Secretary Joseph De Bart to-day in his annual report to the twenty-first annual convention of the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association of America, in session here. Of this amount, said Mr. De Bart, \$226,200,000 was received from internal revenue and \$19,200,000 from import duties on liquor.
