BOY KILLED BY DYNAMITE BLAST

His Companion Injured by Rocks Thrown 1,000 Feet Away at Stone Quarry

Carlisle, Pa., May 11. — Fragments of stone hurled over one thousand feet by an overloaded blast in a stone quarry near Centerville, yesterday afternoon caused the death of Benjamin Rice, aged six years, and the serious injury of Robert Eckenrode, aged 14. So severe was the explosion that windows were broken in the town and several workmen slightly injured. The boys were hauling a plow on a sled to a field adjoining the quarry. Through some error an overcharge was placed in the hole and when it was exploded fragments of rock were hurled in every direction. The boys were over 1,000 feet from the quarry, but the rock pieces fell all about them.

Snyder, of Harrisburg, were authorized to employ an accountant to examine the books of the water company with a view to presenting evidence to the State Public Service Commission that the rates are too high.
