Smith of Cleveland is leading the batters with a percentage of .388. Fournier, of Chicago, is ahead in home runs. Graney, of Cleveland, leads in total bases with 46, and Speaker, Cleveland, and Felsch, Chicago, set the pace in runs scored at 17.

Judge, of Washington, leads in stolen bases with 8. Detroit leads in club batting with 350.

Robertson, of New York, leads the National League batters, of whom 12 are doing .300 or better. Williams, of Chicago, is leading home run hitter, with the score of 9 to 0 in the batting column.

Chicago, leads in runs scored with 17, and Carey, of Pittsburgh, in stolen bases with nine. Brooklyn sets the pace in club batting with 374.
