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UPPER END TEAMS READY FOR GONG

Lid Goes Off in Dauphin-Perry League Tomorrow; Umpire Assignments

The lid of the 1916 baseball season will be pried off in three of the towns on the Dauphin-Perry League circuit to-morrow, namely, Millersburg, Halifax and Dauphin, and arrangements have been completed at each place for

the accommodation of a large number of fans. The contests at Millersburg and Halifax are scheduled to start at 3 o'clock, and that at Dauphin will be begun at 4 o'clock.

President E. C. Lutz, of the league, announced his umpire assignments this morning. John Frazier, chief of the staff, will be stationed at Millersburg, where the Marysville and Millersburg teams will clash. Jacob Deckard will officiate in the game between Dauphin and Newport, at Dauphin, and J. B. Berry will handle the indicator in Halifax, where Duncannon and Halifax meet.

State Leaguers Return
Several players who have participated in games with State League clubs, but who had agreed to play in the Dauphin-Perry organization prior to starting playing with the teams they are with at present, will be back

in the line-ups of their respective Dauphin-Perry clubs at the start of play to-morrow. In the list are Brickler, who will play at Dauphin, and Wertz, who will be with the Newport club.

Dauphin expects a number of Harrisburg fans to be on hand for the game there, and for that reason the start will be delayed until 4 o'clock, in order to allow time for persons leaving this city at 3:43 o'clock to reach the playing field. This train will stop at Lucknow, and a number of fans will be picked up there.

The Newport club has been granted permission by the majority of clubs on the circuit to play player Frankhouse in the opening game at Dauphin. Halifax will also be allowed to use C. Rhoades in the opening game by consent of the majority of the other teams.
