It is very long below the waist, with greater snugness where the thigh fullness begins than in the actual hip space. The woman who needs this will appreciate what it means. Instead of the uncomfortable tightness at the bend of the body when one is seated there is a comfortable looseness through this line, in this model, and the limb below is bandaged into a tapered effect so imperative for any appearance of grace. The shoulder is sufficiently high and wide to give a smooth flat back no matter how much fat there may be to dispose of. Both these models lace under the front steel. STATE WILL ASK MEDICAL ADVICE

Physicians Will Be Requested to Furnish Opinions on Certain Problems

The opinion of the medical profession on health insurance, will be obtained by Commissioner John Price Jackson of the Department of Labor and Industry according to an announcement made to-day at the conference of physicians on industrial diseases. A committee of eminent physicians and surgeons in Pennsylvania

will be requested, by Commissioner Jackson, to prepare a report on the advantages or disadvantages of health insurance as viewed from the attitude of the medical profession.

Another committee of surgeons will be requested, by Commissioner Jackson, to draw up a report designating what, in their opinion, constitutes a major or a minor operation under the meaning of the workmen's compensation act.

The act stipulates that the maximum remuneration for a physician performing a minor operation, on an industrial accident victim shall be \$25, and for a major operation the maximum charge may be \$75.

A clinic for the study of industrial diseases exclusively is to be established in Philadelphia by the co-operative effort of Dr. Alfred Stengel, professor of medicine, University of Pennsylvania. Commissioner John Price Jackson and Dr. Francis D. Patterson, chief of the division of industrial hygiene and engineering, of the Department of Labor and Industry. This announcement was made to the several hundred physicians and surgeons from all sections of Pennsylvania attending the conference on industrial diseases and accidents yesterday and has brought much commendation.

This clinic, which is virtually the first of its kind, will be established with Dr. Stengel at its head, at the University of Pennsylvania Hospital in Philadelphia shortly after June 1. An entire hospital ward will be devoted to sufferers from diseases presumed to be

contracted in their employment and from conditions under which they work. Two physicians of the hospital and a score of social service workers will assist Dr. Stengel in his study of the cases and exploration of the field of vocational diseases which medical experts declare has never before been thoroughly investigated.

The studies and clinics will attract physicians and surgeons, interested in vocational diseases and treatment of unusual industrial accident cases, in the entire eastern section of the country. The findings of the clinic and its investigations will have a direct relation to workmen's compensation as already the compensation board has been called upon to decide whether some afflicted workers have been injured in their employment within the meaning of the act or whether they are suffering from diseases not subject to compensation.

Commissioner Jackson will notify, by letter, Pennsylvania industrial plants of the creation of the clinic with the information that it is open to workers suffering from ailments peculiar to their trades. It is probable that other clinics of a similar nature will be founded in other sections of the State by co-operation of eminent physicians and surgeons with the Labor Department. The whole field of diseases caused by employment will be investigated. At the present time it is conceded that there are few specific industrial diseases known to originate definitely from vocational causes. Conspicuous among these are lead poison-

ing and poisoning by other metals, caisson disease or "the hends" suffered by workers in water-tight chambers at high atmosphere pressure and brass foundry disease.

Other broad fields for investigation by the clinic will include diseases caused by dusts in open air work as well as in confined places. Studies will be made to determine the efforts of dust in woolen and textile mills, in mines, in cement mills, in flour and cereal mills and even among road workers and threshermen.

JUDGES TAKE BIG PART IN PLANNING

Good Roads Day Work Is Being Pushed in Western Counties of the State

The State Highway Department to-day received word that Judge Aaron E. Rieber, of the Butler county courts, has issued a proclamation urging people of his county to unite in working on the roads or by contributing to make State-wide good roads day a success on May 25. The proclamation calls upon each supervisor to give hearty support to the movement and on owners of automobiles to give the use of their machines to take workers to and from the places designated for work. Every able-bodied citizen is called upon to arrange his business so that he can give next Thursday to his county and his community. The proclamation also urges that businessmen, manufacturers, heads of schools and all employers close on the day so that people can get out on the roads and work. In Somerset county Judge E. H. Ruppel presided at the meeting to organize that county for systematic work on

the roads on Thursday. Subcommittees will be formed in every township and district so that the work may go along determined lines.

In several other counties judges have become members of committees to help the arrangements and some will shovel dirt themselves.
