STATE INSURANCE

\$100,000 SURPLUS

Board Must Set Aside 5 Per Cent. of All Premiums For Catastrophe Fund



In an opinion given to State Treasurer Robert K. Young, chairman of the State Workmen's Insurance Fund Board, Deputy Attorney General William H. Keller holds that the Board must set aside five per cent. of all premiums collected on insurance in the State fund for the creation of a surplus until the surplus amounts to \$100,000, but that it also has authority to set aside more than five per cent. for the surplus fund until it reaches 100,000. This surplus fund is to cover what is known as catastrophe hazard of all subscribers to the fund and to guarantee the solvency of the fund.

Mr. Keller also holds that after the surplus fund amounts to \$100,000, the board may, at its discretion, set aside five per cent. of the premiums col-

lected for the purpose of maintaining the surplus fund.

Commission Here. — The Public Service Commission is considering the lease for conduits between the Philadelphia Electric Co. and the Keystone Telephone Co. in Philadelphia today. The commission will have executive sessions to dispose of cases to-morrow and Saturday.

Nearby Charters. — The Duncannon Merchandise Company of Duncannon, has been chartered by A. A. Clark, A. C. Logan and E. J. Hilton, of this city, with a capital of \$10,000. The Littlestown Hardware and Foundry Co. of Littlestown, was chartered with \$5,000 capital by Wrightsville people.

Franklin Bridge Authorized. — The Water Supply Commission has approved the construction of a Franklin county bridge near Williamson and a Union county bridge in West Buffalo township.

Accounts Filed. — Expense accounts were filed at the Capitol to-day by the following candidates at the recent State-wide primary: William A. Glasgow, Jr., \$100; W. J. Lynett, \$170.77; William S. Aaron, \$112; N. B. Slack, \$75. Under \$50: Charles Sechi, Harry Keller, George R. Scull, Frank L. Morton, James Elverson, Jr., Thomas H. Garvin, J. B. Waidelich, M. J. Lewis, J. Harvey Burke, A. V. Dively, Mahlon H. Myers, E. E. P. Prugh and John T. Lenahan. The latter certified that he "did not spend a cent."

Next Meeting in June. — The State Board of Pardons will have its next meeting, the last before September, on June 21.

Dam is Authorized. — The Water Supply Commission last night authorized the construction of a dam for the York Haven Water and Power Company to be built across the Susquehanna at Three-Mile Island in Londonderry township. A hearing was held and was found not to conflict with public interest.

Congressman Here. — Congressman John R. K. Scott, of Philadelphia, who was here yesterday attending the meeting of the State Board of Pardons, plans to visit Harrisburg often during the next Legislature. To use his own words he is going to help make it live here. He did in 1913.

Pleaded With Display. — Samuel I. Spyker, associate counsel of the Compensation Board, highly complimented the Telegraph on its window boxes. "It's a mighty fine thing and I would like to see more of them on business buildings," said he.

To Speak at Quarryville. — Governor Brumbaugh will speak at the dedication of the new school at Quarryville to-morrow.

Compensation Board. — The Compensation Board began a session here to-day and will hold a hearing on the Maulfrier case to-night.

Capitol Visitors. — Representatives Twibill, Philadelphia; Geiser, Easton; Stern, Philadelphia; and Ex-Representatives Miller, Allentown, and Abbott, Philadelphia, and W. W. McElroy, of West Chester, were at the Capitol.

Comes From Twenty-second. — J. J. Conners, appointed a clerk in the Auditor General's Department, comes from the Twenty-second ward, of Philadelphia. His appointment is credited to City Commissioner George L. Holmes by some people on the Hill.

To Purchase Normal Schools. — The possibility of purchasing the Millersville and Kutztown Normal Schools will be discussed by the State Board of Education at the meeting May 31. Final action of the purchase of the Bloomsburg school will be taken.

Two Get Respite. — A stay of execution in the cases of Thomas Chickler and Gasper Marturano, Cambria county, sentenced to die during the week of May 29, has been granted to the week of June 25.

Appointed Associate Judge. — M. S. Hershberger, of Everett, has been appointed associate justice of the Bed-

ford county courts to succeed J. M. Huff, deceased. The appointment was recommended by John M. Reynolds.

Expense Accounts Filed. — According to expense accounts filed at the State Department to-day, J. M. Pascoe, candidate for alternate delegate at large in Northampton, contributed \$150 to the Republican county committee. T. H. Given, running for alternate delegate at large from Allegheny, gave the Palmer committee \$125. Walter E. Ritter, Democratic candidate for delegate at large from Lycoming, spent 20 cents for stamps on ten letters. Others under the \$50 limit were Charles Matthews, Lawrence, alternate delegate at large; James B. Murray, Lackawanna, for Auditor General on the Democratic ticket; Thomas B. Ross, Congress at large; Thomas B. Smith, Philadelphia, delegate at large; Louis Alexander, delegate at large, Philadelphia; Max S. Apt, alternate delegate at large from Allegheny; Ellis L. Orvis, candidate for Senator from Center.

SAMUEL G. SHEARER VISITS HIS FOLKS IN THIS CITY

Samuel G. Shearer, superintendent of the great Babco shops of the Panama Canal, is visiting his folks in Harrisburg. Mr. Shearer was chosen as head of the big construction shops over a large number of older men which was a compliment to his efficiency. General Goethals considered several available machinists and indicated Mr. Shearer as his choice.

It is the opinion of Superintendent Shearer, who is extremely modest in discussing his work, that there will be little difficulty hereafter in keeping the canal open. He believes the worst phases of the slides have been overcome.
