HIGH SCHOOL FOR WEST SHORE LANNED

other important information bearing on the subject from each district and present them at the next meeting to be held at the same place next Thursday night. Figures presented last night show that to erect a \$100,000 building on a ten-acre field fully equipped would increase the mill rate

of the respective districts, only two and six-tenths mills.

Much Popular Interest. Much interest is manifest in educational circles in the "cross river section. The alumni associations of the communities are getting active and are working hard to make the plan a sure go. To have a school of this caliber located in a central part of the section would mean much to the advancement of the student who becomes delinquent in his education in the schools as they are now operated.

The East Pennsboro school loan passed at a special election yesterday may help in the situation. Some of

this money will be spent in erecting a high school building. Should the new plan go through this money could be used in the erection of the centrally located building. According to plans made last night the central school proposition will be put before the people at the general election in November.

The districts which will be represented in the school when permanently located are, Lemoyne, East Pennsboro township, West Fairview, Camp Hill, Wormleysburg, Shiremans-town, Lower Allen township and New Cumberland. Those who represented the districts at last night's meeting were: Lower Allen, Harry Bickler and C. C. Stoner; Wormleysburg, W. F. Bate, the Rev. Ebner S. Vance; Edward F. Baum, Harry C. Knier; West Fairview, L. S. Hatfield; Camp Hill, Dr. W. F. Kendall, Stephen Hubertis, U. G. Frye, E. O. Pardoe; Lemoyne, L. F. Baker; East Pennsboro, H. L. Hoffman.

The East Pennsboro school loan passed at a special election yesterday with 232 voting for the loan and 38 against. Out of about 950 voters only 270 cast ballots. In the lower precinct, at Washington Heights, where there are 290 voters, 57 voted for and 7 against. In the upper precinct at South Enola of 280 taxpayers, 98 voted for and 16 against; in the other upper precinct at Enola, of nearly 500 voters, 177 voted for and 15 against. This will increase the indebtedness of the East Pennsboro township to \$72,000.

Work on the new buildings will be started as soon as the architect, C. Howard Lloyd, of Harrisburg, submits his plans, probably within the next two weeks. According to present ideas, two buildings will be erected—one at Mann's Woods, to be used for high school purposes, and another on the site of the burned building, at Enola, to be used for the lower grades. The structure at Mann's Woods will be a four-room building, while the other structure will have eight rooms and will be equipped with an auditorium to accommodate 500 persons.

Washington Heights will benefit with the loan, \$6,000 will be used in building an addition of two rooms to the present building. A modern heating plant will be installed to replace coal stoves, in use at present.

FACES GRILLING ON MAIL LOBBY

Pennsylvanian Accused of Attempting to Influence Senate Committee

Washington, May 26.—Fourth Assistant Postmaster General James I. Blaklee, of Mauch Chunk, Pa., accused of instructing postmasters to write letters to Congressmen, opposing the action of the Senate Committee on Postoffices and Post Roads on the question of rural delivery and the Railway Mail Service, faces the possibility of dismissal from the service. Senator Bankhead, chairman of the committee, yesterday sent a peremptory letter to Postmaster General Burleson, demanding that Mr. Blaklee appear before the committee on Saturday to answer charges of inspiring a lobby and using Federal employes to write untruthful attacks.

ORDER FURTHER HEARING ON SHIPPING BILL

Washington, May 26.—Further hearings on the Administration shipping bill before the Senate Committee on Commerce were directed yesterday by resolution of the committee. These hearings will begin Monday morning, and this action means further delay for the legislation and probably its ultimate defeat in the Senate.

CONTRACTS WILL

BE LET ON JUNE 1

Special Meeting of Board of Grounds and Buildings Scheduled For That Day



Contracts for furnishing supplies to the State government will be awarded by the State Board of Public Grounds and Buildings at a special meeting to be held on June 1. At this meeting the results of the bids opened recently will be submitted by Superintendent Rambo and awards formally announced. At the same meeting the board will approve the schedule for the year beginning June 1.

The board is asking bids for the new laundry and power plant at Polk, to be closed on June 13. The plans for these buildings have been under direction of Mr. Rambo as they will replace buildings destroyed by fire and will be the first to be built from the State Fire Insurance fund.

New Bids Asked.—The Highway Department is asking for bids for road contracts, including some which are readvertisements. The bids are to be closed June 13 and are for roads in Chester, Delaware, Montgomery and Beaver counties.

Districts Paired.—The State Treasury has paid checks for \$172 to the following High School districts: Berrysburg, Dauphin, Mt. Holly Springs, West Fairview, Wormleysburg, Bloomfield and Liverpool.

Cashier's Mother Ill.—Assistant Cashier J. B. LeCompte, of the State Treasury, was called to Kane by the serious illness of his mother.

Photographs Sent.—A number of photographs of people working on the State roads were sent to-day to Governor Brumbaugh as proof of activities.

To Re-elect Kline.—Cumberland County Republicans will re-elect Josiah W. Kline, of the State Library, as county chairman at the annual meeting in Carlisle to-morrow night.

Investigations On.—Chief Clerk R. R. Featonby and Warden J. P. Albert of the department of fisheries, were called to Lancaster county to investigate pollution matters.

Governor Leaves.—Governor Brumbaugh left this morning for Quarryville, where he will speak with Congressman Grist at the dedication of the new school in that town. He will return Monday.

Maulfair Case.—The final argument in the Maulfair compensation case, which has attracted attention all over the State, will be held to-morrow. There was a rehearing last night.

Many Charters.—This month will come near making a record for issuance of charters at the Capitol. There have been many approved by the Public Service Commission as well.

Demurrers Signed.—Auditor General Powell yesterday signed the demurrers in the tax cases and they have been filed in the Dauphin County Court.

New Rules.—The Board of Medical Education and Licensure has adopted rules that will provide the examination for applicants for licenses to practice medicine shall be held in Philadelphia at the time of the regular midwinter medical examination and that candidates for examination who graduate after January 1, 1917, must produce evidence that prior to graduation from a medical school they have attended personally not less than twelve obstetrical cases.

CRITICISE GOVERNMENT FOR NEWSPAPER CENSORSHIP

Two of the principal speakers, Deputy Oertel, Conservative, and Deputy Hirsch, National Liberal, severely criticised the government for measures which they alleged were adopted to suppress criticisms of the United States in the newspapers and to put brakes on the agitation for a more vigorous submarine campaign.




