### WILL VOTE FOR HUGHES

### SWAMPS SHOULD BE DRAINED NOW

Pennsylvania Has Large Areas Which Could Be Turned Into Producing Land

Pennsylvania has many swamps that could be very easily drained and turned into the richest farm lands, says Charles G. McLain, drainage and water supply engineer of the Department of Agriculture.

"These swamps are usually very rich and produce good crops of anything planted there," says Mr. McLain, "and as a rule all of them have an outlet of sufficient depth to allow good drainage. The best way to go about the draining is to put through a good-sized open ditch with a few branch ditches to get the surplus water away and allow for the natural setting of the ground to a compactness that will then take place.

"When this settlement has taken place a good system of underdrainage can be arranged. In doing this the large open ditches can be filled as they interfere with economical operations on account of the time taken up in turning the teams on the small lands. By working the entire surface longer rows can be used and much time saved in cultivation, planting and harvesting.

"It has been my pleasure to have laid out drainage systems in a number of these swamps and all are giving good results. If you have one of the swampy or wet places on your farm you are losing the use of possibly the most productive land you may own. Why continue to cultivate steep hillsides where the work is both hard and expensive when you can improve this low level land and use the hillsides for a permanent pasture land?"

"The reports from parties who have developed their low lands are very encouraging, as all indicate a much greater return with less expense and labor. The cost of this drainage is not prohibitive, for the greater returns soon pay it back. Even on land that is constantly cultivated the return is sufficient to pay all expense in a very few years."

### FROST BITE GOES IN COMPENSATION

Important Opinion by the State Compensation Board Issued Today

The State Workmen's Compensation Board in an opinion rendered today upheld the award of Referee George W. Beemer, of Scranton, that a claimant for compensation on the ground that he had been incapacitated by frostbite was entitled to relief under the compensation act. The case arose when an employe of a quarry company had the fingers of both hands frozen to such an extent that he was totally incapacitated.

The employing company appealed, contending that the injury was not one on which compensation should be paid, since it was due to a condition not possible for an employe to control or avoid, and that the claimant might have avoided injury by wearing warm gloves, and further that it was a risk common to all persons whose business, employment or pleasure called them outdoors.

In the opinion of the board, it is held that English compensation cases cited do not apply, but that freezing and frostbite have been held to be injuries by accident in Massachusetts and by the Solicitor General of the United States in construing the federal act. The opinion concludes: "Frostbite causes an immediate change in and injury to the part affected; it can not be considered a disease in any proper sense of that word. It is of sudden origin, and is, therefore, violence to the physical structure of the body and a compensable injury."


