essor Phelps was in rare form and addressed the class on "Culture and Happiness." He quoted the definition of happiness as given by the late Timothy Dwight, former president of Yale University, as "The happiest man is the man who thinks the most interesting thoughts"; and then went on to give his own ideas on happiness, refuting the generally held opinion that the four years at college, which loom up big to the young graduate, are the four happiest years of a man's life! "If that were true," said Professor Phelps, "what a dismal outlook would be the future. The older a man grows, the happier he becomes, because his thoughts become more interesting. Music, art, nature, books, these are the forms in which happiness is to be found, and it is necessary to go after it in order to achieve it." And by art, he explained that he meant the cheap photograph of a great painting as contrasted with an expensive painting that has not the elements of greatness. "The charm of culture is that it is individual and appeals to each person in perhaps a different way," he continued.

Prof. Phelps Lauds the Susquehanna
 Professor Phelps made a very happy reference to the Susquehanna river and appreciated the value of property along the river by proclaiming it, in his opinion, one of the most beautiful streets in the world, by reason of the presence of nature in all its wonderful setting right here in Harrisburg. "If we were a western town," said the speaker, "we would be constantly splitting our sides boasting about the Susquehanna." He also took occasion to lament the fact that this city could not boast of an orchestra such as Philadelphia has. His remarks were full of humorous references and were received with great enthusiasm.
