

News and Gossip of Capitol Hill; N. G. P. Officers Are Busy



The State Workmen's Compensation Board in an opinion rendered by Commissioner John A. Scott today upholds Referee G. W. Boerner, of Scranton, in refusing to allow compensation to a widow of Frank DeSarno, who was fatally hurt by an automobile.

Governor to Speak.—Governor Brumbaugh will speak at the Aden's convention at Philadelphia on Monday. He will be here Tuesday.

Prepare for Officials.—Denny O'Neil, the new State Insurance Commissioner, will assume the duties of his office early next week and the commission on him is now being made out at the department of the secretary of the commonwealth, who will administer the new office.

Both of the new officials will give bonds to the Commonwealth for \$10,000, these sums being fixed by act of Assembly, and they will be executed by them within a few days.

Steese, chief clerk of the Department of Labor and Industry, who for a fortnight has been mediating between the strikers and employers.

Explosives for Mines.—Chief Roderrick, of the Department of Mines, held a conference yesterday at the Logan House Altoona, with the officials of the Sonman Shaft Coal Company, the mine inspectors of that territory and the representatives of the miners in regard to the use of permissible explosives in the coal mines.
