[Continued From First Page] with impressive ceremonies, consists of a massive pedestal holding a life-sized bronze figure of Molly Pitcher, the head and facial features of which were secured from composite photographs of the faces and heads of lineal female descendants living in Carlisle.

The ceremonies were preceded by an impressive parade of patriotic organizations, fire companies, school children and quasi-military organizations.

Senate Stands Firm on Elimination of Relief Issue

Washington, June 28.—Insistence upon its amendment to the House military drafting resolution, striking out the million-dollar relief appropriation for dependents of enlisted men was ordered by the Senate to-day after a disagreement on that issue had been reported by its conferees.

Another effort, probably will be made to induce the House to eliminate all reference to relief, including even the Senate proposal to provide exemption from service for enlisted men with dependent families.

Germany Sends Ultimatum on Exchange of Foodstuffs

Paris, June 28.—A Zurich dispatch to the Matin says that Germany's demands on Switzerland for the exchange of commodities are in the form of an ultimatum which expires at 6 o'clock Thursday night.

Announcement was made in the Swiss parliament last week that Germany demanded that the Swiss government permit exportation of cotton and foodstuffs collected by German agents, stating that if the demand were not complied with Germany would prohibit exportation of coal, iron and other materials essential for Swiss industries.

GREEK SITUATION CRITICAL

Athens, June 28, via London.—The situation in Greece remains critical and full of uncertainty although the demands of the allies are being rapidly carried out. The royal decree for the general demobilization of the Greek army was signed by King Constantine yesterday afternoon and Venizelos adherent, Zymbrakakis, will be sworn in as chief of police to-day.
