
WARD-COOPER MARRIAGE

Arrangements for decorating the Chestnut Street Auditorium, which is to be Christian Endeavor convention hall, July 11-14, are being rapidly carried forward by the decorating committee, A. J. Lightner, chairman. A large American flag, two Christian Endeavor monograms and a star, all outlined in electric lights, will mark the building. As a feature of the interior decoration will be the placing of a number of pictures of officers of the United Society of Christian Endeavor in the auditorium. Among these will be the portrait of Dr. Francis E. Clark, the founder of the movement, and a picture of Williston Church, Portland, Maine, in which he organized the first society in 1831. Dr. Clark has recently returned from an extensive journey through China, Korea and Japan in the interests of Christian Endeavor work. This picture of Dr. William Shaw, for years the general secretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, will be prominent. Dr. Shaw is to be one of the speakers.
