## RUSSIANS AND BRITISH MAKE GREAT GAINS

[Continued From First Page.]

Gen von Linsingen's troops at one point, while Petrograd announces the taking of some 13,000 prisoners during Sunday's fighting.

Latest reports from the area of the allied offensive in the Somme region indicate one of the usual periods of infantry inactivity incident to operations of this sort. The attacking forces are meanwhile consolidating their newly won positions and bringing up heavy artillery preparatory to renewed attacks. Emperor William is reported at the front in the Somme sector.

In the Verdun region the French have been on the aggressive. Following up successes yesterday west of Fleury, southwest of Vaux, they gained additional ground last night in the same region, capturing three machine guns in their advance. In Lorraine southeast of Nomeny, two German attacks were repulsed.

Paris announces the landing of an additional contingent of Russian troops in France, supplementing the force estimated at 25,000 sent late in April and early in May.

**Russian Loss in Great Offensive 300,000 Is Reported by Germans**  
Berlin, July 17 (by wireless).—According to official reports from Petrograd, says the Overseas News Agency, "in the period between the beginning of the Russian offensive and July 1 the number of those killed reached 14,900 officers and 248,000 men. Included among the officers were 17 generals and 29 regimental commanders."

"Advices from Stockholm say that the Russian finance minister, having failed to obtain a loan from England and France, undertook negotiations with bankers in the United States, which also failed. England declared that the cost of the war to herself had reached such a point that it had become impossible to assist her allies. The Russian newspaper Rech, commenting on this situation, most violently insults Americans for their 'egotism,' saying that at last 'the mask of sympathy for the allies has been torn from their faces.'"

## Sixth Contingent of Russian Troops Reaches France to Fight Germans

Paris, July 17.—A contingent of Russian troops disembarked to-day at Brest, France.

The Russian troops will be sent to camp from Brest and later to the front.

This is the sixth contingent of Russian troops the arrival of which in France has been reported. Between

April 20 and May 5 there arrived at Marseilles five bodies of Russian soldiers after a land and sea journey of about 15,000 miles from Moscow, where they were assembled, to Port Dainy, Manchuria, and thence by water via the Suez canal. The number of men in the first five contingents has not been given officially, but is believed to be about 25,000. These troops were quartered at Camp de Mailly, near Troyes, for several weeks, and then sent to the front. The official French communication of last night showed that Russian troops were in the trenches of the Champagne.

## British Take Another Trench and Find Couple Hundred Wounded Germans

British Front in France, July 17, via London.—The British to-day captured a German trench in the neighborhood of Pozieres.

The capture of the trench strengthened the new British line in this vicinity.

The British also cleared out nests of German machine gun operators who had been holding out in cellars and behind barricades in the ruins of Ovillieres and La Boisselle. Otherwise the situation along the British front is unchanged at this hour.

A total of about 100 officers and men surrendered to the British, who had steadily closed in upon them, using bombs and trench mortars, the Germans being short of food.

In an enormous cellar at Bezanthe-le-Petit the British found several hundred wounded Germans who had taken refuge there. It was tragic business for the British litterbearers bringing them back through the German shell fire which was meant for the British reserves and gun positions. There were cases where a litterbearer was wounded and put on a stretcher emptied when a wounded German on it had been killed by the same shell.

The British persisted until all who had not received a final wound in transit were safe in the rear.

A captured record of a German battalion shows that 600 of its number were killed or wounded by the British shell fire bombardment before the attack began.

**Sir Roger's Case Is in Court of Criminal Appeal**  
London, July 17.—A new chapter

opened to-day in Sir Roger Casement's legal fight against being executed for high treason for his activity in the Dublin revolt. Sir Roger's case reached the Court of Criminal Appeal and although the new proceedings hardly compared in point of public interest with the trial, privileged spectators began to take seats an hour before the court was called to order.

## Plan Bill For Erection of New Irish Government

London, July 17.—Premier Asquith said in response to a question to the House of Commons to-day that it was the intention of the government to introduce the bill for the erection of the new government of Ireland before the adjournment of Parliament for the autumn recess.

William O'Brien asked why, if the Premier wished "the thanks of every Dubliner in Ireland," he did not block the project altogether.

Replying to another question, the Premier said permanent settlement of the Irish question would be considered at an imperial conference after the war.

Such a conference, he continued, was a subject in regard to which both parties to the arrangement in Ireland were in agreement.

## Von Hindenburg May Head Eastern Armies

Berlin, July 17.—According to private advices from Vienna, important changes have taken place in the Austro-Hungarian army and others in high places are impending.

As a result of the Russian offensive something akin to a shake-up may take place.

In Germany, there is a strong movement to place Marshal von Hindenburg in command of the entire eastern front, including the Austro-Hungarian armies.

## SHOOTING AFFAIR ON PERRY FARM

Argument About Death of Poultry Causes Fight Which Ends in Shotgun Work

Cove, Pa., July 17.—A shooting affair occurred on a farm near here yesterday, which might have had a serious ending, but which resulted only in slight injury to one of the participants.

It appears that for some time past chickens and ducks have been dying at the farm of W. O. Strine, located just outside of Cove, and Isaac Platt, who lives in the town and is employed on the Strine farm is said to have charged William Gipple and his son, Charles Gipple, both of Cove, with having poisoned the poultry.

Yesterday the Gipples, father and son, went out to the Strine farm and started an argument with Platt, trying to explain their innocence.

Platt, who is very hard of hearing, did not understand all that was said, it appears, and knocked Charles Gipple to the ground. This started a free-for-all fight in which Platt got the worst of the contest.

He then ran to the house and got a double-barreled shotgun and fired twice at the men. One lead struck Charles Gipple in the leg, but did not do more than cause slight cuts in the skin.

Then William Gipple, the father, went to Marysville and swore out a warrant before Justice of the Peace W. B. Davis charging Isaac Platt with assault and battery. The warrant was sent by Justice Davis to Constable C. O. Miller of Duncannon to serve.

Platt was arrested and placed him in the Duncannon jail. He was to be given a hearing before Justice of the Peace H. H. Sieg at Duncannon this afternoon.

**TRAINLOAD OF SHRAPNEL**  
The Pennsylvania Railroad reports large shipments of war munitions to Russia. Yesterday a special train of 75 cars passed through Enola yards enroute to Seattle, Wash. Each car was loaded with shrapnel. Since July 1, it is estimated that 3,500 cars with munitions for Russia have been handled at Enola and in Harrisburg.

**TO PICNIC AT HERSHEY**  
The annual picnic of the Sunday school of the Holy Communion Lutheran Church, Seventeenth and State streets, will be held at Hershey to-morrow. Because of the strike of the Harrisburg Railways Company employees, a special train has been arranged for on the Philadelphia and Reading Railway, leaving Harrisburg at 10:30.

**Emperor William in Somme Battle Sector**

London, July 17.—An official telegram from Berlin says that the Emperor William of Germany is now in the Somme battle sector, according to Reuter's correspondent in Amsterdam. The Emperor has received reports from the chief commander, visited hospitals, distributed iron crosses and made speeches, the telegram stated.

## Abandon Campaign of Shark Extermination; Will Extend Wire Nets

Washington, D. C., July 17.—Suggestions that a campaign of extermination against sharks along the Atlantic be undertaken by the coast guard service were abandoned to-day by Treasury Department officials after considering a report by Captain Cardena, of the cutter Mohawk, saying such a campaign would be impracticable and that the only sure method to-day from gibbering reports the extension of the steel wire nets already in use at most resorts.

Captain Cardena, detailed to investigate the shark situation, spent Sunday at Asbury Park conferring with city officials and resort managers. He reported that all agree that it would be futile to attempt extermination of the vicious from gibbering reports the extension of the steel wire nets already in use at most resorts.

The coast guard officials will continue to lend any assistance possible, although it is believed that little can be done beyond advising the installation of nets and caution on the part of individual bathers.

**OCEAN ALIVE WITH SHARKS**

New York, July 17.—The captain of the British steamer Merioneth, in victory from Gibraltar reports that on July 6 and on succeeding days he and members of the crew sighted sharks ranging in length from eight to ten feet in large schools. The American steamer Charles Beatty, which reached here from Tilt Cove, N. F., reports the ocean alive with sharks. Captain Beatty says he never before saw so many sharks. From fifty miles east of Fife Island to port, he says, he saw schools of sharks, probably several hundred in all, from six to twelve feet long.
