Denver, Colo., Aug. 4.—Attorney General Farrar to-day will file notice of intention not to prosecute 43 out of 50 cases in Las Animas county arising out of coal strike disorders in 1913-14.

The seven indictments in Las Animas county which will not be dismissed, charge murder. Three are against John Lawson, Colorado member of the international board of the United Mine Workers of America.

Under another indictment growing out of Las Animas strike disorders, Lawson was found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment. He is at liberty on bail pending action by the State Supreme Court upon an appeal.
