### JAMES RUSS, FORMER HOTEL MAN, DIES

(Continued From First Page)

Mrs. Genevieve Russ Booth, wife of Henry Booth, of New Haven, Conn.; sons, Louis, of Harrisburg, and Joseph, New York; three brothers, William, Patrick and John, Harrisburg, and one sister, Mrs. Clement B. Johnson, this city.

Had Varied Interests  
Mr. Russ was also at various times identified with local enterprises, including the Harrisburg Traction Company, and other subsidiaries of the Harrisburg Railways Company; the United Ice and Coal Company and was one of the original stockholders of Harrisburg's first artificial ice manufacturing company.

Born In Italy  
Born near Lucca, Italy, March 19, 1848, Mr. Russ was the son of Louis Russ, known as a cooper, a brick manufacturer and olive grower, of Pietro Ponti, Italy. James came to this country with his mother and three brothers, Narcissus, William and Patrick, when a small boy, his father having preceded the family by a year.

Family of Businessmen  
All of the Russ family are, or were, familiar figures in the business life of Harrisburg. Narcissus, father of Maurice Russ, the proprietor of the Columbus Hotel, and James, were first in business with their father's firm, "The Russ Line" of fast freight, a business similar to that of the Peiper line of today. Lead cars, or refrigerator cars, were the first in the road, then and the Russes bought produce in Philadelphia and Baltimore, making shipments throughout the middle Pennsylvania district for outside concerns and individuals.

Prominent Hotel Man  
James Russ was associated with his father until 1873, when he went into the hotel business at the Harris house. Later, about 1876, he took charge of Brant's hall, one of the old-time show places of the city, which was built by the builder of "Brant's Folly" the building since converted as the Sylvan Heights Home for Orphan Girls. Brant's hall site is now occupied by the Commonwealth Trust Company building. James Russ ran the hall until 1881, when he took the Grand hotel, which stood on the present site of the addition to Bowman's store, Market street.

Famous Grant's Tomb Trip  
For many years the Grand hotel was the resort of politicians. Matthew Stanley Quay making it his headquarters, as did all of the old school politicians of those days. Mr. Russ was a palibearer at Quay's funeral. Many political deals were developed and planned at the Grand.
